THE PRINCE OF WALES AND HIS
BROTHER RETURNING HOME;
THE KING HOLDING HIS OWN

London, Nov. 27—Soon after a bulletin tonight saying that King George was still holding his own in his struggle against pleurisy, the British public received the equally welcome information that the heir to the throne had decided to return to England. The Prince of Wales notified the Prime Minister, apparently on his own initiative that he and his brother were returning. The assurance that His Majesty was holding the strength which has enabled him to fight his illness for nearly a week was welcomed tonight especially as medical opinion had been that he was approaching a crisis which would determine the course of his illness.

A brief bulletin was issued from Buckingham Palace tonight at the same time that it was announced that a warship had been ordered to proceed to East Africa to be placed at the disposal of the Prince of Wales. The bulletin read: "The King passed a less disturbed day. His temperature was somewhat lower than at the corresponding hour last night. His strength was maintained."

Ship for Prince

The admiralty has directed H. M. S. Enterprise to proceed from Aden to Dar-Es-Salaam and there hold herself at the disposal of the heir to the throne. The Prince, who has been hunting in the African interior was due tonight at Dodoma, Tananika, which is on a railway and connected by telegraph.

The bulletin issued by Sir Stanley Hewett and Lord Dawson of Penn seemed to omit to say as much as it conveyed. Last night it had been stated frankly that His Majesty's temperature was 101.6, while tonight it was termed "somewhat lower."

The statement that his strength is maintained, indicating that he retained his powers of resistance, was highly significant in an illness of this nature. Nothing, however, was told about progress or abatement of the lung congestion or pleurisy and this omission tended to increase public anxiety. The morning bulletin had said that these "conditions were otherwise unchanged," and it therefore was assumed that there was little change in the lung disturbance and that much depends on the strength of the King's heart.

Hopeful reports given earlier in the day by the Duke of York and the Home Secretary had tended to allay the general anxiety and some optimism had been induced by word that the royal patient had passed a more restful night and had a less disturbed day.

News Hopeful

Both physicians of the King remained for dinner at Buckingham Palace tonight after seeing His Majesty and issuing the bulletin. It was stated that the palace officials regard tonight's news as reassuring and hopeful.

In this conclusion it was noted that the Queen of Spain, a cousin of His Majesty went to the theatre tonight.

Queen Mary in her trouble found time to reply through her secretary to a telegram from Commander Florence Booth, expressing in behalf of her husband and thousands of members of the Salvation Army deep sympathy with Her Majesty in her hour of trial and earnest hopes for the King's speedy recovery. The Queen replied with her grateful thanks and appreciation adding "the Queen hopes that the health of General Bramwell Booth may steadily improve."

Crowd Waits

Despite the exceedingly cold day a large crowd stood tonight outside the palace awaiting word of His Majesty's condition. The executive council of the Irish Free States sent to the palace a resolution of sympathy for the King and his family and hopes for his speedy recovery.

Messages to the Dominions office show that the illness of King George is received with deep concern throughout the Empire. Messages of sympathy and expressing earnest hope for his recovery are being constantly received.

Got Some Sleep

It is understood on good authority that the King obtained a certain amount of sleep today, which undoubtedly resulted in an improvement in his condition. The phrase "strength has been maintained," which has appeared in most of the previous bulletins on the progress of the King's illness, was repeated in tonight's palace bulletin.

Mr. John M. Reid. It is said that if a deal can be made all three will be taken over and a large brick block erected.

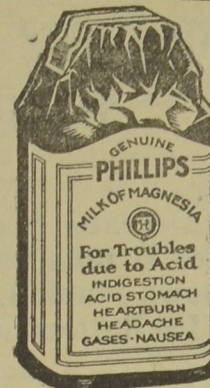

Market Notes.

Foreign exchanges were quiet in New York yesterday, with sterling and the Canadian dollar firm. Japanese yen had another drop, falling 22 points to 45.83 cents. The total stock sales, 5,267,500 shares.

Call money renewed at 7 per cent in New York yesterday and was successively stepped up to 9, the highest figure since Oct. 2. Banks called some \$40,000,000 during the day to meet the holiday demands and to adjust their position at the Federal Reserve Bank. The recent movement to Canada reached \$10,000,000 today.

Yesterday the Montreal market needed only a few more shares to make the total business for the day 250,000 shares. Less than two weeks ago the previous record was created at 216,300 shares. In another few days it is not improbable that the turnover will be creeping up around the 300,000 share level.

Brazilian and Nickel.

Montreal, Nov. 28—The fact that Nickel established a new high yesterday, 224 created no surprise as a sharp advance has been anticipated between now and the time set at the end of the month for the deposit of old shares in exchange for the new. The old stock is now naturally getting scarce and it appears that only a limited number of shares is being retained by brokerage houses for trading purposes. This stock will be all exchanged by the end of the month.

It is stated on good authority that the new stock is getting a wonderful distribution throughout the United States and Canada. Its low price and the bright future of the industry, now so well established, is literally filling a long felt want. The fact that it is an organization which is developing Canadian natural resources is also an attraction throughout the Dominion.

Brazilian Traction is in an entirely different class but seems likely to have as wonderful a career as any owing to its extensive utility services in the most important provinces of Brazil where the possibilities of expansion are not unlike Canada.
