

NO LETUP IN THE  
HEAT WAVE ALL  
OVER PROVINCE

Temperature Continues  
High at 90 Degrees  
Today in Capital—  
Similar Heat All Over  
Maritimes.

The third day of intense heat which the city has been sweltering in was alleviated somewhat by the slight breeze which was prevalent today. However, the thermometers about the city registered over 90 degrees in the afternoon, climbing rapidly from 60 in the morning until 85 and 90 had been reached at the noon hour. The temperature at the University rose to 85 at noon. The citizens of the capital city are going about with as little raiment as possible and a great number are spending their time at the bathing beaches in an effort to keep cool.

Fredericton is not the only city in the province which is suffering from the torrid heat of the past few days. Other places all over the Maritimes are feeling the blazing rays of the warmest August sun in eight years. At Moncton, St. John, Halifax, Sydney and places in northern New Brunswick the temperature ranges well above an average of 85 and in the majority it is higher.

St. John had a meagre 82 alongside the others above 90 degrees in the shade. The hot wave will be a boon to farmers who are resuming work in the hay fields after a three week's layoff due the heavy rains previous to this week. In the meantime there is no sign of any letup in the heat and the forecasts are for continued fine weather.

POULTRY FIELD  
DAY CELEBRATED  
EXPER. STATION

Over 200 Visitors Present  
at Day's Activities  
at Local Station—Addresses on Poultry  
Given.

The semi annual Poultry Field Day which is being held today at the Experimental Station in this city drew a large attendance of those interested in poultry from all over the province. 150 persons had arrived this morning and expectations are that over 200 in all will be in attendance. The work this morning was taken up with review of the farm and culling contests as well as general business discussions. Interesting lectures relative to poultry work were given this afternoon.

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THE NETTING  
SEASON FOR  
SALMON ENDED

Closed Yesterday on  
Both the St. John and  
Miramichi Rivers—  
Catch of Fish Has Not  
Been Heavy.

The season for netting salmon on the Saint John and Miramichi rivers closed yesterday, in the case of the Miramichi the date being two weeks earlier than last year. The nets are all supposed to be out of the water today and within a reasonable time the stakes must be removed. It is the duty of the fishery officers and guardians to see to it that this is done.

High water during the greater part of the season has interfered with the catch of salmon and there was quite a falling off in the total as compared with previous seasons. On the St. John River however some nice fish were caught during the latter part of May. On the Tobique fly fishing has been below the average and this is said to have been due to an increased number of nets along the river.
