## AN EDITOR PRAISED.

The Truro Rotary Club had for a guest a few days ago Mr. F. A. Bayrd, a millionaire newspaper proprietor of Malden, Mass. Mr. Bayrd addressed the club a year ago, and chancing to be back in Truro he was called upon for a repeat order. He chose for his subject "Newspaper", and in the course of an able address handed this bouquet to Mr. W. D. Dimock, the genial old bachelor who edits the Truro News:

"I would be recreant to my sense of appreciation did I not conclude these remarks with a tribute to one, who has labored faithfully among you presiding over the destinies of your newspaper for over a generation, who has assumed the accused innocent until proven guilty, who has been the friend not the invader of private life, who has never been the assailant of character but who has always been the keeper of the public conscience, who all through the long years has printed nothing of a man that he would not say to his face; who has never printed anything of anyone in malice, who has respected the old and defended the weak, and who lastly in day time and at night time has been good to the girls and square to the boys—Wilbert D. Dimock, the Grand Old Man of Maritime Journalism—the last of the Romans.

"Cherish him, gentlemen; cherish his trenchant pen. Cherish his broad and tolerant mind and warm and kindly heart. May he be spared for many years, to minister as he has so devotedly in the past, not only to your beautiful Truro, but to the picturesque hamlets and villages that are nestled among the hills, beside the rivers and along the shores of your beloved Colchester."

Mr. Dimock is not only an editor and a bachelor, but in his day he has represented the county of Colchester in both the provincial and federal parliaments. He certainly deserved the large bouquet handed to him by his American friend.

## SECESSION CRY IS HEARD IN ONTARIO
