### TWO BRAVE POLES.

What was fated was fated. "Nitch-echo!" exclaimed Major Louis Idzikowski just before the two gallant Poles started their attempt to make the westward flight over the Atlantic. "What does it matter?" is given as a literal translation from the Russian. Many days Idzikowski and his companion in the adventure, Major Kasimir Kubala, had waited. Each day came an adverse weather report and so it was again. Fogs were to be expected, they were told. But their preparations were complete; even their radio had been jettisoned to make way for additional fuel; their minds were made up. "Nitchecho!"

The word is from the Russian idiom and seems to have the fatalistic sense of the Oriental "Kismet." If trans-oceanic flying is to come, starts may not wait all summer. What was to happen would happen. Go now they would—for the glory of Poland. So away into the void above the Atlantic Ocean they flew.

They are indeed two gallant Poles and the world rejoices at their remarkable rescue. It was the most narrow of narrow escapes yet recorded in all the storied course of the aerial trans-oceanic exploits. Crashing to the water and apparently cast from their plane, they were saved while swimming by a German steamship. They live to fly again and "Nitchecho" is added to the world's vocabulary, happily not as an epitaph but as an expression of implacable purpose.
