## ONTARIO PROVINCIAL POLICE SEIZE THE STOCKS OF LIQUOR EXPORTERS AT WINDSOR, ONT.

Windsor, Ont., Aug. 10—Seizing every liquor export dock from Belle River to Kingsville and placing their wet stocks aggregating several millions of dollars in value, under police guard, the Ontario government today charged every explorer on the border with unlawful possession of liquor and ordered them to appear in court next week to answer to the charges.

Firing a broadside of subpoenas along the entire liquor front, Provincial Police squads, under the command of Inspector F. E. Elliott, of Toronto, served legal notice on 36 exporters of the attack on them by the Ontario Liquor Control Board, the body through which the Attorney-General's Department is moving.

Conviction will mean a fine of \$100 to \$1,000 for each of the exporters, or a jail sentence. Magistrates and judges may order terms in lieu of fines, if they wish. The huge stocks of liquor, also, are automatically confiscated to

the government in the event of conviction.

Heading the list of exporters against whom the government moved into action today are Harry Low, head of the Carling Brewery-Erie Transit Company Syndicate, and Sid Nathanson, head of the Inter-Transit Company, an exporting concern for the widespread liquor interests.

Low and Nathanson are to appear in Windsor police court on Monday. The other exporters, it is understood, will be arraigned in Sandwich court, also early in the week. It was definitely known this afternoon that Nathanson had received his summons and that one was made out for service on Harry Low. However, it was not known whether or not Low had yet received his subpoena, since he was in Toronto together with his brother, Sam and Charles P. McTague their lawyers.

Nathanson has been charged under section 90, paragraph one, of the Liquor Control Act.

The usual outside attractions will take place in the Trotting Park in front of the grandstand, with both afternoon and evening performances and these also are sure to be bigger and better than ever. The Masonic Concert Band of Halifax has been secured for the engagement and it is one of the finest in the east.

was a patient of Dr. O. E. Morehouse and had a bad attack of appendicitis. He was operated upon soon after his arrival at the hospital and made a complete recovery. Mr. Burtt is satisfied that the trip by car was a factor in saving his life.

### Was Ordered Away

In speaking of his arrival at the hospital Mr. Burtt recalled with a smile that one of the attending physicians came out wearing his surgical robes and sharply ordered him to "take that thing off the grounds at once." The physician's principal objection to the car was that it was frightening the horses hitched in the vicinity. Mr. Burtt went on to say that the auto in its early days caused timid horses to rear and plunge, but he added "they soon got bravely over it". The doctor who objected to the presence of a car on the hospital grounds, Mr. Burtt said, soon became the owner of two of them, and seldom used any other mode of conveyance when calling on his patients. It all goes to show, he said how public sentiment has changed towards the horse, less carriage.

"I have owned and driven quite a number of cars during the past eighteen years" said Mr. Burtt in conclusion "but I will never forget my experience with my first flivver. I don't think I could be hired now to venture on the roads with such a machine."

## QUEBEC HAS DECLARED WAR ON SPEEDERS

Quebec, Aug. 11—Hundreds of licenses have been cancelled by the Provincial Roads Department for various offences, but this will only be a drop in the bucket, according to J. L. Boulanger, Deputy Minister of Highways, compared to what is to follow, in view of the Department's declaration of war on speeders.

As each license is cancelled and sent into the office of the Deputy Minister, a card is attached to each showing why the permit was cancelled, and out of 15 cards that were shown newspapermen this morning, two were for driving while under the influence of liquor, and the remainder for speeding along at from 42 to 59 miles an hour in different sections of the province.

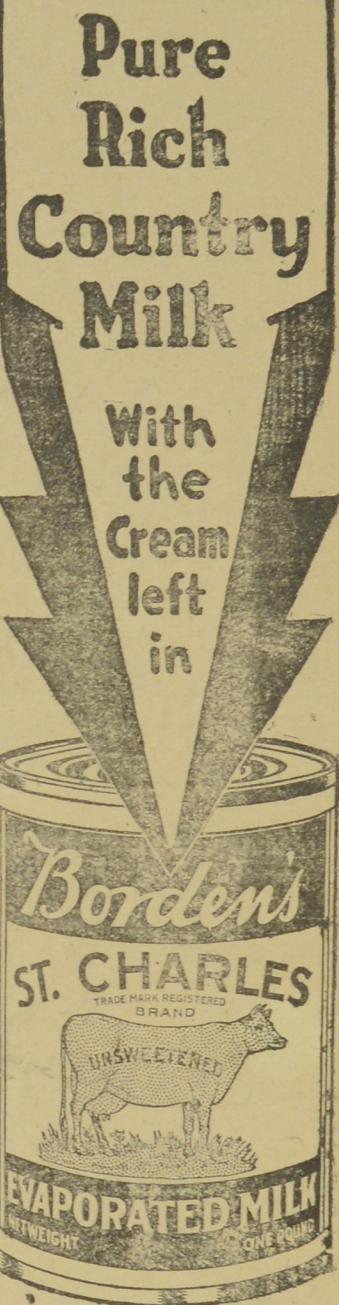
