LIBERAL CHARGE THAT THE CREDIT OF NOVA SCOTIA IS IMPAIRED, WAS UNFOUNDED

Halifax, Sept. 24—The Conservative Government has thrown a bombshell into the Liberal campaign propaganda with the opinions secured from New York money authorities in regard to the credit of the Province. Silent on this important subject which the Liberal leaders and party supporters all over the Province were using widely and very effectively, the Provincial Secretary has made public a dozen or so opinions from the money authorities of New York regarding the credit of the province.

Attacked by the Liberals on the score that the Rhodes Government had lowered the credit of the Province and had failed to negotiate the bonds offered for sale last year, Conservatives were silent while the Provincial Secretary was in touch with groups of financiers in New York securing their opinion as to the credit of the Province at the present time.

The result of the secretary's work has now been announced.

Three questions were "wired" authorities of the highest standing.

1. Had the credit of the Province of Nova Scotia become depreciated in the financial markets of the world during the last three years and if so for what reason.

2. Our best offer for proposed debenture issue, June 15, last, \$10,550,000, 4 per cent, 30-year was 4.68 largely refunding of past issues which had matured. Was that rate due to anything else than the great change which had occurred in the cost of money this year and common to all bond issues of consequence?

3. Was it in line with the money situation at the time. The request was for an extremely impartial and authoritative reply.

Replies Received.

The replies have been received promptly and in each case there is denial of the suggestion that the credit of the Province had depreciated.

In part the answers read:

Bankers Trust Co., New York: "Credit of Province has not become depreciated during the past three years. The price which you received for your bond issue in June reflected the cost of money at that time. Bond prices have gone even lower since

that date. Your Province enjoys a good credit rating."

Brown Brothers & Co., New York:

"Credit of Nova Scotia is most highly regarded and has not become depreciated in the financial markets. In June New York was swamped with a number of securities and tenders rendered were in line with higher money rates and weaker market quotations."

Lee Higginson & Co., New York:

"Regard the credit of Nova Scotia highly and consider the bid made for its bonds in June last in accordance with money conditions at the time."

William R. Compton Co., New York, answered "no" to the first two questions and "yes" to the third.

Kountze Brothers, New York: "The credit of Nova Scotia is and has for many years been very high. Changes reflected in recent biddings due solely to money conditions."

Chase Securities, New York: "We should rate the credit of your province first class as we have in the past."
