ville and was prominent in farming

visiting relatives.

Previous Attempts

According to neighbors of the vic-
tim this is not the first time that
an attempt was made on Graham's
life. On three or four previous oc-
casions shots have been fired at
him while he was at work about
his place. These neighbors could
name no one whom they knew to be
an actual enemy of the deceased;
though it is generally known about
previous attempts made on his life.
One of these attempts is said to
have resulted in a bullet clipping
his ear.

All efforts are being made by
authorities to affect a solution of the
mystery and bring to judgement the
perpetrator of the dastardly crime.
Police constables have been de-
spatched for duty in that locality
and an intensive search is being
made today for clues.

In the meantime the body of the
unfortunate farmer is in charge of
the undertaker. An inquest will be
held tomorrow afternoon at one
thirty o'clock.
