BIG INCREASE
IN ASSETS OF
COMMERCE BANK

Toronto, Jan. 10—E. R. Wood, Toronto financier, was elected a vice-president of the Canadian Bank of Commerce at the annual meeting today. He holds a newly created position. President Sir John Aird, vice-president, Sir Thomas White and board of directors were all re-elected. An increase of \$46,000,000 during the year, in the total assets of the bank was referred to in the course of the address of S. H. Logan, general manager. The total assets are now up to almost \$559,000,000, he said, creating a further record. Deposits had increased \$34,000,000 while there was a moderate increase in net profits.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Union suits for the growing child will last much longer if a piece of bias cloth is inserted at the waist line.

Serve slices of oranges with green tea as well as lemon.

All odors of cooking may be eliminated by pouring a little oil of lavender into a dish of boiling water.

You can make a delicious jam by saving the fruit pulp from jellies adding sugar and spices and boiling until thick.

To be exact you should sift flour before measuring it.

Paste blotting paper or felt on the bottom of ornaments to keep them from scratching polished tables.

When preserving use kettles of graniteware or porcelain.

Strips of adhesive plaster which can be marked with ink may be utilized for labels on preserving.

Rub machine oil on window screens before putting them away for the winter and they will not rust.

Too much salt in the soup may be remedied by stirring in a couple of pinches of brown sugar.

SOFT CUSTARD.

2 cupfuls milk
2 tablespoonfuls sugar
Salt
2 to 4 egg yolks
Flavoring

Scald the milk in a double boiler beat the yolks add the sugar and salt and pour the hot milk slowly onto this mixture. Return to the double boiler and cook stirring constantly until the custard coats a spoon. Remove at once from the fire and set into cold water. Add the flavoring. The more yolks used the thicker the custard will be.

FRUIT CUSTARD.

Slice two oranges and one banana into a glass dish. Pour the hot custard over the fruit and chill. Whipped cream or a meringue may be used as garnish.

Two-in-One Tea Cake Recipe.

2 cups pastry flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1-2 cup butter
1-2 teaspoon lemon extract
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
1-2 cup milk
1-2 teaspoon vanilla

Sift the baking powder with the flour. Cream the shortening beat in the sugar gradually then the beaten eggs and flavoring. Add the dry ingredients alternately with the milk. Beat two minutes.

Divide the batter in half. To one half add ¼ cup chopped nut meats and to the remainder an equal amount of sliced candied orange or grapefruit peel. Both nuts and peel should be dredged lightly with flour. Bake the cakes in small tea cake pans in a moderate oven (375 degrees F.) for about 20 minutes.

Cover with frosting when cool.
This recipe makes two dozen cakes.

TWO-IN-ONE FROSTING

2 egg yolks
Few grains salt
1 pound package confectioners' sugar or 2 2-3 cups.

Beat the egg yolks add the salt and stir in as much sugar as possible. Divide the frosting into halves to one half add one tablespoon cocoa and 1-4 teaspoon vanilla and one tablespoon coffee. To the second half add one tablespoon orange juice. Add more sugar to each frosting if the mixture is not stiff enough to spread.

Cover the nut tea cakes with the frosting and decorate with a halved nut meat or cover the fruit tea cakes with the frosting and sprinkle with finely chopped candied orange or grapefruit peel (sliced candied peel may now be purchased in quarter pound packages).

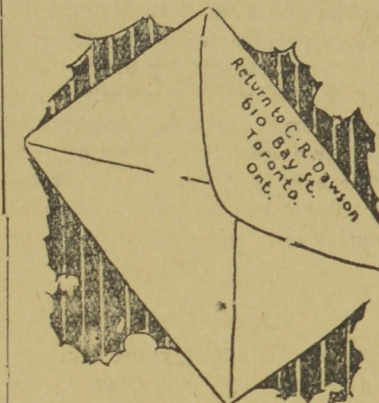
Premier Baxter has got his Minister Agriculture to introduce a measure the next session of the New Brunswick Legislature that will be a great advance in Agriculture in that Province.

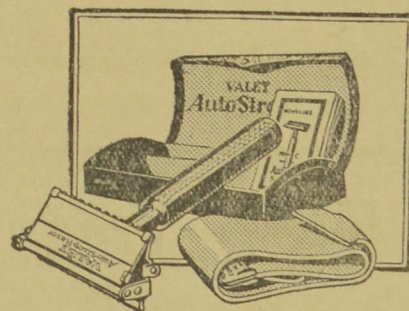
