MUCH PULPWOOD IS NOW BEING SHIPPED TO U. S.

Recent Change in the Weather Has Given Quite a Stimulus to the Operations in the Woods.

The recent change in the weather has given quite a stimulus to the pulpwood trade and large shipments are being made to the American market. The soft weather during December made it very difficult for teams to get in and out of the woods, consequently very little pulpwood was moved, but the recent cold spell brought about a marked change. In the southern part of the province the absence of snow is a severe handicap, but in the central and northern sections of the province conditions are more favorable, although the snowfall has been less than in former years.

Hundreds of cars are being loaded each week at points on the C. P. R. and C. N. R. and are going forward to the United States. One of the largest shippers is Mr. E. C. Atkinson, M. L. A., who is loading seventy-five cars every week. Mr. Stanley Scott of this city is also making extensive shipments from the scene of his operations in different parts of the province.

The bulk of the pulpwood now being shipped was cut and peeled under contract early last summer.

Police Court.

The case of a local young man who was charged with damaging a pool table in the Capital Pool rooms some time ago, and against whom information was laid by the proprietor, appeared in court this morning before Police Magistrate Limerick J. B. McNair was prosecuting attorney for Di-Sinto, proprietor of the rooms. After several witnesses were heard the case was adjourned until twelve o'clock. Several more witnesses were heard at twelve o'clock and judgment was reserved until four o'clock when a decision will be given.

LUMBERING CONCERNS TO BE REORGANIZED

Big North Shore Companies to Operate in the Future Under the Name of Restigouche Company, Ltd.

Mr. R. B. Hanson, K. C., M. P., has returned from Edmundston where he attended a reorganization meeting of the lumbering concern of Stetson, Cutler & Company, which is now a subsidiary of the Fraser Companies, Limited. It was decided to change the name of the company to the Restigouche Company, Limited. The plan of reorganization will take in the Richards Manufacturing Company of Campbellton and also the Continental Lumber Company with headquarters at Charlo, Restigouche County. The last named company was for some years under the management of Mr. William Currie, ex-M. P. P.

The reorganization of Stetson, Cutler & Company and its amalgamation with the Richards, and Continental Companies will mean greater development for the north shore lumber industry.

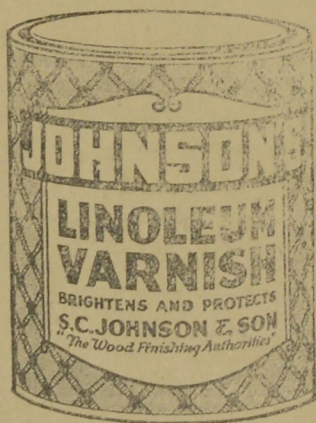
Bank Stocks Up.
