A GREAT CONVENTION

The convention of the Canadian Forestry Association which closed here at noon today has been a grand success in every way. For this great credit is due to Hon. C. D. Richards, Minister of Lands and Mines, and the officials of his department who made all arrangements for the gathering. The dinner at the Experimental Station last evening brought together more than two hundred ladies and gentlemen, including delegates and their wives, members of the provincial Legislature and citizens of Fredericton, who were privileged to listen to able addresses stressing the importance of protection and conservation of our forest wealth. The educational value of the Canadian Forestry Convention cannot be estimated in dollars and cents and much good is bound to result from it.

The delegates, who included many of Canada's great captains of industry have been favored by beautiful weather and have been privileged to see Fredericton at its best. Naturally our wonderful shade trees have attracted their attention and brought forth the remark from one of the speakers at the dinner last evening that he had never seen such beautiful trees anywhere. The visitors have greatly enjoyed their brief stay here and cannot fail to carry away with them a good impression of the city and its thrifty and hospitable people.

A LIVE WIRE

President W. E. Golding, of the Canadian Forestry Association is undoubtedly the right man in the right place. Although young in years and quiet and unassuming he is one of the leaders in the lumbering industry in this province and is doing splendid work. He is the manager of the New Brunswick Railway Company, president of George McKeen, Limited, president of the River Valley Lumber Company, is identified with a number of other concerns and besides is a member of the Crown Land Advisory Board. One would imagine him to be a busy man yet he has found time to discharge in a most efficient manner the duties of president of the Canadian Forestry Association. Although rather small in stature Mr. Golding is one of New Brunswick's big men and is worth more than his weight in gold to this province. Possibly it may be news to many people to learn that Mr. Golding is a citizen of Saint John, New Brunswick.

The sale of the Restigouche fishing leases last year for \$75,500 was commented on by Dean F. D. Moon of Syracuse in his speech at the forestry banquet last night and described as a good business transaction. It might be added that nearly all of the leases were sold to sport loving citizens of the Uncle Sam's domain who know a good thing when they see it and are willing to pay the price.

of having trained forest rangers. It was difficult to get good men if he could only get five months work a year. He should be employed steadily and kept in the locality. It was a mistake to shift men after they had learned their district.

Gilbert Prince, Deputy Minister of Lands and Mines for N. B. said that the problem was a serious one. The look-out tower has a great educational effort. There are not sufficient towers in this province. Mr. Prince said that more money would be granted to build more towers. He stated that in N. B. there were some secondary towers not included in the sixteen mentioned.

In speaking on the address on "Woods, Water and Wild Life," delivered by Allan S. McAvity, president of the N. B. Fish and Game Protective Association, Mr. Robson Black said that there should be, as the speaker had said, some way for the game protective associations and the forestry association to co-operate.

Illustrated Lecture

Prof. Webb, of the Forest School of the University of New Brunswick, spoke on "Young Forests" and showed some excellent moving pictures in illustration.

Vote of Thanks

A vote of thanks moved by Avila Bedard and seconded by W. H. Kilby, was extended to the Hon. C. R. Richards, G. H. Prince, and S. C. Miller for their co-operation in managing the convention and the work they had done to make it a success.

Mr. Golding thanked the delegates who had come from a distance and said that he was sure that N. B. would benefit as a result thereby.

Col. Wilson spoke highly of Mr. Robson Black's work in arranging the meeting and thanked him for his efforts.

DAMAGE FROM FOREST FIRES LIGHT SO FAR

growth of small diameter which has kept the losses down. In view of the hazardous period during the month of May when from May 5th to 10th there were no less than nineteen fires reported the relatively small timber damage which has occurred will be a pleasant surprise and the results speak well for the efficiency of the protective arrangements of the Forest Service.

The causes of fires this season in New Brunswick are summarized by the Forest Service as follows:

Land-clearing fires ..... 13  
Fishermen, campers, picnic parties, berry pickers, dam builders, drivers, smokers neglect of camp fires ..... 17  
Unknown (under investigation) .. 13  
Fires spreading to forest from burning buildings ..... 1  
Incendiary ..... 1

Of a total of fifteen railway fires, fourteen occurred in May and one in June. Eleven occurred on the Canadian National Railways, two on the Canadian Pacific Railways and two on the Fredericton & Grand Lake Coal & Railway. About 30 1-2 acres were burned and the damage caused was only \$47.
