HARBOR BOARD IS APPOINTED FOR HALIFAX

Ottawa, Jan. 11—The Federal Government today appointed a harbor commission for the port of Halifax and the board as approved comprises Peter Jack, C. W. Ackhurst and John Murphy. The commissioners are all men who have taken a keen interest in the commercial and administrative affairs of the Nova Scotia capital.

Commissioner Murphy was mayor of Halifax for four years, and prior to that he had sat in the city council for some considerable time. He also served as controller before Halifax abolished that form of civic government. Mr. Murphy on several occasions has offered himself as a candidate in both the provincial and federal fields, but without success.

Commissioner Ackhurst is associated with a large business organization in Halifax and has a thorough knowledge of Maritime commercial activities. He is a well-known public figure who has also served his fellow citizens in the capacity of alderman and has taken a wide interest in the affairs of the city.

Commissioner Jack is a member of a widely known Halifax financial house.

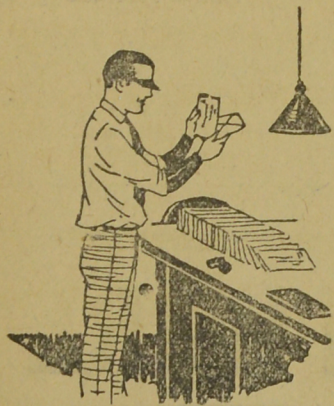
WEEDS.

Next to any glass container, the hardest thing to wrap up to look like something else is a bowling ball.

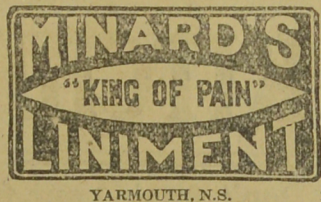

MY NEIGHBOR SAYS.

Milk bottles and glasses in which milk has been served should be rinsed in cold water before washing in hot soapsuds if you wish them to be clear and bright.

If you do not wish to use a whole pineapple at one serving cut off what you wish to use then stand the pineapple with the cut side down on a plate in the refrigerator until you wish to use it again.

Save all lemon and orange peels for fuel. If your fire is low in the morning just place a few skins on the coals with one stick of wood and in five minutes you will have a fire hot enough to put fresh coal on.

Grease stains on wall paper may be eradicated by covering the spots thickly with French chalk. Then hold a clean piece of blotting paper over and pass a warm iron over it. Do this several times till the mark disappears.

To remove covers from preserve jars place the jar top downward in a dipper of hot water (not boiling) and allow it to remain five or ten minutes. Remove the jar from the dipper and insert a steel kitchen knife at different points under the rubber. This will let in the air. The cover can then be removed easily.

LEMON COOKIES.

One cup butter 2 cups powdered sugar; beat to a cream; add 3 eggs well beaten; grate rind one large or two small lemons 1 teaspoon soda; add soda to flour, flour enough to roll thin.

JOHNNY CAKE.

One quarter cup shortening, 1 cup thick sour milk, 1-4 cup sugar 1-2 teaspoon soda, 1-2 teaspoon salt 1 cup flour, 1 egg (beaten) 4 teaspoons baking powder. Cream shortening, sugar and salt together. Add egg then sour milk and soda beaten together. Last baking powder, flour and cornmeal sifted together. Beat until smooth and turn into a well greased shallow pan.

CHOCOLATE CAKE.

One cup sugar, a lump of butter size of an egg. Cream then add 1-2 cup of cocoa in 1-2 cup boiling water, 1-2 teaspoon soda in 1-2 cup boiling water. Before cool stir in 1 3-4 cups flour, 1 teaspoon baking salt and vanilla. The hot water in this cake seems to make it cook much more quickly.

Cabbage, Pineapple, Beet Salad

1 pound cabbage
5 slices pineapple
1 cup diced beets (cooked)

Shred the cabbage and chill in cold water for half an hour; drain. Cut the pineapple into small pieces. Mix cabbage, pineapple and beets with mayonnaise dressing using part mayonnaise and part whipped cream. Serve on lettuce leaf and garnish with sprig of parsley. Six servings.

CHOCOLATE COOKIES

To make delicious chocolate cookies cream one half cup of shortening add gradually one and one half cups of sugar and then two eggs, well beaten. Melt two squares of chocolate over hot water add one fourth cup of hot water to the melted chocolate and add it to the first mixture. Dissolve one teaspoon of soda in one half cup of sour cream; beat into the cookie mixture; add one teaspoon of vanilla; then stir in the flour sifting one half teaspoon of salt with the first cup. About five cups of flour will be needed to make the dough so that it can be

rolled fairly thin. Bake cookies in a quick oven (375 degrees F) for about ten minutes. The recipe makes six dozen.

TOMATO BISQUE.

One can tomatoes strained 2 level tablespoons butter, 2 level tablespoons minute tapioca, salt, pepper and sugar to taste, pinch baking soda 1 1-2 pints hot milk. To the tomatoes add butter tapioca, salt, pepper sugar, baking soda and cook 15 minutes in double boiler. When ready to serve, stir the hot soup gradually into milk which has been heated to the boiling point.

A MAN WALKS MANY MILES TO DELIVER MAIL

Grand Forks, N. D., Jan. 12—Frank Gilby figures he has walked 175,000 miles as a postman in the last thirty-five years, and at seventy he is as actively on the job as ever. In his years of employment with the government he has lost but one day because of illness.

Gilby delivers mail twice a day to an average of 1,000 addresses. He climbs thirty-six sets of stairs twice daily and carries some 600 pounds of mail each week.

In the last thirty-five years he estimates he has delivered 10,500,000 Christmas cards, and says he will never retire on pension as long as he can walk.

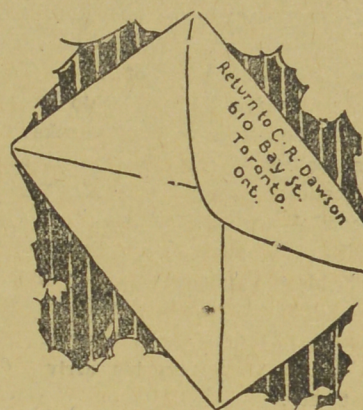
MONCTON LADY MADE QUEEN OF THE REVELS

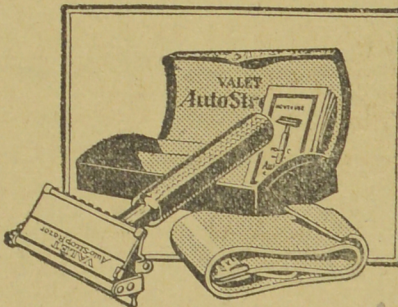
