HEAVY HITTING BY FREDERICTON WINS FROM DEVON IN SECOND GAME OF YORK COUNTY LEAGUE

Good Brand of Ball Played at Devon Last Evening When Imperials Nosed Out the Home Team by 3 to 2 Score—Fredericton Strong With the Willow—Robertson Batted Out of Box in the Fifth Frame—Few Errors.

The Fredericton Imperials won their second game in as many starts when they defeated the Devon team at Devon by the score of 3 to 2 in eight innings last evening. The game was marked by heavy hitting by both teams, the visitors hammering two Devon pitchers for a total of eleven hits, while the Devon team collected nine safeties off the delivery of Harry Garvie, Fredericton's promising young hurler. The team's turned in another good game and the fans, although not as numerous as at the opening contest, watched the game in chilly weather, threatened with rain as showers almost stopped the game on two occasions. In the field the teams fielded well, each having but one misplay.

Manager Parks of Devon, chose Robertson, ex-Maine hurler, who pitched against the Imps in the opening contest, to do mound duty again, while Fredericton sent in Garvie to do slab duty. The Devon hurler was found easily and often, and Fredericton hammered him out of the box in the fifth inning after five doubles and four singles had been collected off him or a total of three runs, and there should have been at least three more. H. Keene who followed, pitched good ball and was found for but two hits and held the Imps scoreless for the remainder of the game.

Garvie, choice of the Fredericton slabmen, pitched good ball for seven innings, but weakened in the eighth when his team behind him, rose to the occasion and gave him gilt-edged support, he was in danger on more than one occasion, and his team was forced to come to the rescue which they did he also showed weakness in fielding his position.

Fredericton Drew First Blood

Davis hit for two bases in the first inning after two were out but McLennahan killed chances by striking out. In the second Staples singled, Shannon sacrificed him to second, Baker struck out. Donovan singled and Staples scored. Garvie grounded out to E. Miles. Two runs were added in the third. Rutter, the first batter, went out O. Keene to

E. Miles. Currie smashed one to right field for two bases. Davis singled. Davis was caught between first and second by Bailey's peg, but Lawrence threw wild to E. Miles and Currie scored. McLennahan again struck out. Staples poked one over H. Keene's head for two bases when the latter was trying to get Davis off second and Davis scored. Shannon was an easy infield out to end the inning.

After two were out in the fourth Garvie hit to leftfield for two bases, but Rutter was thrown out, Robertson to E. Miles. The fifth ended Robertson's career as a flinger for the night. Currie the first batter singled, Davis flied to Malloy. McLennahan redeemed himself and hit for two bases to right-field. Keene was called in to pitch and he and Robertson exchanged positions. Staples was walked and ahe bases were loaded. Shannon flied out to O. Keene and Baker ended the inning with a slow infield hit and was thrown out. Keene pitched himself out o a big hole in this stanza. Fredericton had the bases loaded in the sixth but could not produce a hit for a run. In the last two innings the Imps never threatened.

Devon Scores in Second

Devon went out in order in the first. In the second, H. Keene poked one to centerfield for three bases and scored on Malloy's single through sacrifice. H. Miles walked Lawrence took the count on strikes. Ribertson singled and Malloy was caught at the plate. Good base running would have netted this run. Devon got but one hit in the next three innings. The sixth produced a Devon tally which Garvie himself presented to them. O. Keene opened with a two base hit to right centre field. Garvie tried to catch him off second and on the return throw let the ball get away from him and Keene went to third. Bailey sent a slow-roller to Shannon who threw to Baker on first and O. Keene scored. H. Keene hit to Davis and Malloy struck out. Devon threatened again in the eighth. Rutter took J. Watson's hopper and threw him out. O. Keene flied out to Shannon. Bailey, H. Keene and Malloy singled in succession the hit of Malloys, went off of Garvie's glove. E. Miles anded all Devon hopes when he flied out to Ken Staples. The box score and summary follows:—

BIG SUPPLY OF WATER NEEDED FOR PULP MILL

(Chatham Gazette)

The first step in fulfillment of the contract entered into by the International Paper Co., with the Baxter government, to build a 100 ton sulphite mill on the Miramichi, has been taken by the big concern and three engineers are now here, looking over the available water supply. In charge of the engineering party is J. A. H. Henderson of the Montreal office and one of the cleverest of the younger members of the engineering profession in the Dominion. He is a Canadian by birth and with him is another Canadian, Mr. Fownes, a former Moncton boy. The third engineer is Mr. McIntosh.

The Gazette has it on official information that the purpose of the party is to report on the amounts of water available at the various sources of supply on this end of the Miramichi river and after that information is obtained the question of site will have to be determined.

A citizen who is well acquainted with the problems of pulp mills informs this paper that to operate a 100-ton mill there must be available anywhere from 3,000,000 to 3,500,000 gallons of water daily and a concern looking to the future would want perhaps 5,000,000 or 6,000,000 gallons obtainable each day where they place their mill in order that expansion would be possible if the future called for it.

With the large volume of water needed or desired, it can readily be seen that the first great matter of importance is to find out with certainty what rivers emptying into the Miramichi have this volume in their minimum flowage and which one will be handiest to tap for the best available site. To carry water many miles is a very expensive matter in the initial cost and the shortening of the water pipe line means a great saving to the builders of the mill.


