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Russian Scientists Are Doing Amazing Things

Many of the Secrets of Life and Death are Being Penetrated—Head of a Dog Resuscitated After Being Detached From the Body and Kept Alive for Three Hours.

(Special to The Daily Mail by the British United Press.)

MOSCOW, Nov. 19—Soviet scientists, through an amazing series of laboratory experiments claim they are penetrating many secrets of life and death. In Moscow recently the head of a dog was resuscitated and kept alive on a plate for three hours after the body to which it once had been attached was dead and discarded.

The detached head "barked" with pain and with pleasure, although no sound issued, the vocal cords having been severed. It opened and closed its eyes which were as sensitive to light and touch as any other dog's.

GENERAL BOOTH HAS SUFFERED A SET BACK

London Nov. 19—The progress which General Bramwell Booth has been making toward recovery from his serious illness appeared to have suffered a setback today. He had a bad night Saturday and the medical bulletin issued tonight said "the condition of the General is unchanged. He has not passed too good a day."

High officers of the Salvation Army gathered at headquarters here tonight and anxiously awaited news from the sick room at Southwood where their commander-in-chief was still maintaining his brave struggle against neuritis.

His illness for several weeks has been marked by alternating periods when he apparently showed strong improvement and by setbacks which made his condition again critical. All Salvation Army gatherings in England today offered special prayers for his recovery.

MONCTON HAS AN OUTBREAK OF TYPHOID

Moncton, Nov. 18—A number of cases of typhoid fever have been discovered in Moncton within the last few days and the investigation made by the district medical health officer revealed that all of the affected persons bought their milk from the same man. The homes of all families, numbering some 89, buying milk from that dealer were visited by health officials and urged to be immunized. Samples of milk, water and other material from the farm, which, in the opinion of the Board, should be analyzed, were forwarded to Dr. H. L. Abramson, provincial pathologist, Saint John, where free immunization against the disease is being given at the Board of Health office here.

BANANA CROP WAS HARD HIT BY A GALE

Kingston, Jamaica, B. W. I., Nov. 19—A northerly gale with a wind velocity of 50 miles per hour today had destroyed more than 500,000 banana trees on plantations on the island. The gale has been blowing steadily since yesterday afternoon and losses on the plantations continue to mount.

THE IMPERIAL K. K. K. WIZARD UNDER ARREST

Regina Nov. 19—J. W. Rosborough, chartered accountant and Imperial Wizard of the Ku Klux Klan, who was arrested at his home here Friday night on a charge of theft of \$200 from the Herschel municipality in 1921 was released on \$2,000 bonds in the R. C. M. P. court Saturday. The preliminary hearing was set for next Tuesday.

The arrest of Rosborough came as a sensation close on the heels of the arrest of William Allan, secretary treasurer of the municipality in 1921. Allan was arrested at Vancouver, October 30, on a charge of theft of more than \$3,500 of municipal funds. He was committed for trial when arraigned before the Justice of the peace at Herschel recently.

Rosborough who was auditor for the municipality from 1922 to 1925 refused to make any comment on the charge other than to state that the matter had been the subject of a civil suit three years ago and during those proceedings he had denied any guilt in the matter.

Rosborough was recently elected Imperial Wizard of the K. K. K. in Saskatchewan.

MONEY FOR STOCK GOES BY AIRPLANE

Chicago, Nov. 18—The stock market is talking money up with it—by aeroplanes.

An estimated \$2,000,000 daily is being flown across the country, the American Air Transport Association said, as stock buyers deluge Wall Street with their cheques, drafts and interest-bearing securities.

Use of the air mail saves investors from one to three days interest, the association said.

150 POUND HOG WITH FIVE FEET

Columbia, Mo., Nov. 19—A 150-pound hog with five perfectly formed feet is one of a brood owned by Jesse Young, farmer. The extra foot shares equally with its twin on the same leg the burden of weight and in no way handicaps the hog, which is as active as any of the rest of the brood.

EVIDENCE AT ENQUIRY IS CONFLICTING

The S. S. Vestris Was Leaking Badly Long Before S. O. S. Call Was Sent Out.

New York, Nov. 19—The curtain of mystery concerning what had happened to the liner Vestris, causing her to sink off the Virginia Capes a week ago tomorrow with the loss of 110 lives, has been drawn aside today to reveal a picture of a crew fighting a losing battle to save a ship into which sea water poured through half a dozen leaks.

The story of the battle to keep the sinking ship afloat until help could arrive had been partly told at the hearing conducted by U. S. Attorney Tuttle at which two of the ship's officers testified yesterday and which Mr. Tuttle plans to resume tomorrow.

When the investigation which began Friday to fix responsibility for the disaster was recessed over the weekend and yesterday, Chief officer Frank Johnson, senior surviving officer of the ship and James Adams, Chief Engineer had testified that water poured into the vessel through leaking coal ports which could not be reached because of fuel in the bunkers and through a leak in a "half door" in the side of the ship which could not be properly closed.

Did Not Despair

Despite the rate at which water poured into their vessel and their inability to stop the leaks, both officers said they did not despair of saving their ship until almost the moment when she turned completely on her side, and sank.

The question whether the Vestris had asked for aid or whether her master William Carey had informed his owners or their agents of the ship's plight before the SOS crackled through the ether last Monday forenoon had not been answered when the hearing was adjourned yesterday.

Evidence Conflicting

Testimony has been conflicting regarding when it was discovered that something was wrong with the ship. First Officer Johnson yesterday said it was Sunday night. When reminded that the radio operators had testified that they noticed a list in the ship as early as midnight of Saturday the first officer said "they were wrong."

Johnson also said that Captain Carey had been wrong when in his wireless message to the owners after the SOS he described the sea as "moderately rough."

Work at Pumps

Adams, the Chief Engineer told in his testimony how he had succeeded in stopping two leaks in the ship and of his efforts to keep his steam pumps working against the flood of water flowing in from the leaks which could not be reached. He said that at 11 a. m. Monday he had informed Captain Carey that he thought he could keep the ship afloat and that the master had told him he expected two destroyers by night. The ship went down shortly after two o'clock in the afternoon.

Something Good Promised

Speeches by Sir Henry Thornton and others to be delivered this evening at a banquet on board of the Lady Nelson, now at St. John will be broadcast this evening by station CFNB on a hook up with station CNRA. It is expected that the program will begin shortly after eight o'clock. It is claimed that this will be the first effort ever made in Canada to broadcast from a ship.

CONDITION NOT SERIOUS

LONDON PRESS CRITICIZES THE VESTRIS PROBE

FATHER OF LATE PRES. HARDING PASSES AWAY

 Santa Ann, Calif., Nov. 19—Dr. Geo. Harding, father of the late President Warren G. Harding, died here today at the home of his sister Mrs. E. E. Romsberg.

Dr. Harding suffered a stroke of paralysis Friday night and failed to regain consciousness. Death came shortly after 4 a. m. Dr. Harding was 85 years old.

A PAVILION WRECKED BY EXPLOSION

 Kansas City, Mo., Nov. 19—Two terrific explosions rocked the entire north side today and destroyed the ringside pavilion of a boxing exhibition hall.

Several other buildings were damaged by the resultant flames. Firemen said they believed the blasts were incendiary. Wreckage appeared to have been oil-soaked.

LABOR HAS ELECTED THE LARGEST GROUP

Floods in the Border States Take Big Toll Of Life and Property

A Cold Wave and Snow Follows Torrential Rains—Eleven Lives Lost in the States of Missouri, Kansas and Oklahoma—Property Damage May Exceed \$30,000,000.

KANSAS CITY, Nov. 19—A cold wave and snow following torrential rains that forced rivers out of their banks in the southwest added to the discomfort and suffering of flood refugees today.

In the wake of the weekend floods was a toll of eleven known dead in three states—Missouri, Kansas and Oklahoma. Several unverified deaths were reported. Property damage is immense and as the receding waters showed the extent of the havoc, it was believed the total would go above \$30,000,000.

A Serious Situation

Kansas City, Mo., Nov. 18—Week-end floods in Missouri, Kansas and Oklahoma tonight had claimed at least nine lives and wrecked damage that will run into millions of dollars.

Although the worst danger was over at most points affected, a cold wave that followed the torrential rain-fall of Friday and Saturday in the southwest rendered the plights of hundreds of refugees and relief workers pitiable tonight.

Beside the known nine dead, several persons missing were believed to have drowned. Farmers and railroads suffered the heaviest damage losses. Many cities and towns in the flood area were isolated, due to inundation of highways and railroad tracks and damage to communication lines. These conditions have made impossible a comprehensive checkup on the total at present.

GEN. M'LEAN MAY BE THE NEXT LIEUT. GOVERNOR

St. John, Nov. 19—Not for many seasons has there been such a prolific crop of political rumors than during the last few days, involving matters both federal and provincial. While many of these reports have been declared to be without foundation, there is a general belief that others are based upon fact, and that their realization is only a matter of time. It is said to be practically certain that Major General H. H. MacLean, of Rothesay, will be the next Lieutenant-Governor of New Brunswick, succeeding Hon. W. F. Todd, of St. Stephen.

A rumor which has been current for some time, and which persists, is that the Senate vacancy which followed upon the death of Hon. G. G. King of Chipman, is to be filled by the appointment of Hon. Dr. W. E. Foster, at present chairman of the Saint John Board of Harbor Commissioners, and that his place on the harbor board is to be filled by the advancement of W. E. Scully from membership on the board to chairman. R. T. Hayes is said to be the prospective new member of the commission.

THE BRUCE GOVERNMENT IS SUSTAINED

Melbourne, Nov. 19—With many seats still in doubt tonight following the general elections yesterday the ultimate standing of the parties in the new House of Representatives was indicated as follows: Nationalists and Country Party (Government) 44; Labor 31.

The coalition government headed by Premier Stanley Bruce was sustained by the electors who turned out to the polls in record numbers. In some districts 97 per cent of the electorate voted.

The majority of the coalition in the House of Representatives will apparently be reduced by eight members with the gain going to the Labor party. The Nationalist-Country coalition was represented by fifty-two members in the last Parliament.

The vote in the Senate elections is being counted with the results so far too incomplete to indicate the result. One third of the Senate membership was to be elected. In the late Senate the government had twenty-six out of the thirty-six seats.

DEATH LIST HAS CLIMBED TO FORTY-ONE

London, Nov. 18—Forty-one persons were killed in a terrific storm which swept southern England during the past few days. Of these 19 were killed in various towns, 17 were killed in the disaster at Rye, Sussex, when the crew of a life-boat perished while attempting to bring tid to a stricken vessel. Five others were drowned in the wreck of a small schooner.

CHRISTMAS CLUBS

New York, Nov. 19—It ought to be merry. The Christmas Club of New York figures that Christmas clubs of the country will distribute some 500,000,000 shortly.
