POLICE COMMIS. HEARD 6 WITNESSES AT INVESTIGATION

called and evidence was taken. His evidence was as follows: He had brought the LeBlanc men up from the jail in the morning and locked them in the cell room. Their case was to have come up that morning but by consent of counsel, the case was adjourned until the afternoon. He then left. He came back at 12.20 o'clock and took Whalen from the cell and locked the cell after him. Witness was very emphatic over this point. On the way out the prisoner, Whalen asked him whether he had locked all the doors and Officer had replied that he did, trying the outside one. When witness returned near two o'clock Officer McNeill told him of the escape of the prisoners.

Harry McNeill
Officer Harry McNeill was the next witness. He came on duty Wednesday, 14th, at 12.40 o'clock. The LeBlancs were in the cell enclosure. No one else was in the building at the time. Witness went into the corridor of the cells for a few minutes. Dominic LeBlanc asked him where the chief was. Witness said that he had gone to dinner. The prisoners said they were hungry. Then they asked witness what the penalty was for jail breaking. Dominic said he knew what it was in Dorchester. Officer McNeill then went out to get dinner for the two. He left the police station at about one o'clock. When questioned he said that the cell door was shut and evidently locked so he didn't bother to try it. He arrived back with the lunch at 1.20 o'clock and found that the two prisoners had made their escape.

At first, witness said, he thought that the chief had come back and had taken the prisoners up stairs. He found the cell door half way open and the other door open also. The bolt in the cell lock was back as if it had been unlocked and his first conclusion was that the two men had been taken out by the chief or one of the officers. Officer Hartt then arrived and he asked him where the prisoners were. That officer said he didn't know anything about them. The two were just beginning to investigate when Chief Jones arrived and verified the suspicion that the two had made good their escape in some manner.

Warrants Issued

Chief Jones notified the Provincial Police, who immediately took steps to have warrants issued against the two for breaking from custody, which is a serious offence and the district hereabouts was quickly scoured for traces of the two men. So far no results have been had. The investigation held this morning was done for the purpose of easing the public mind as to the nature of the escape of the two Moncton men and also for the purpose of learning whether any outside help was given the men in making their escape from custody.
