Forty Four Turf Performers Bought by Foreign Magnates in Recent Old Glory Vendue.

Cleveland, Dec. 20—Though American trotting stallions and broodmares have been exported to Europe for years, there still exists a big foreign demand for the United States product of the standard-breed. This fully was exemplified at the 34th annual Old Glory Sale recently conducted in New York.

No less than 44 horses found new owners across the sea. Six countries England, Sweden, Austria, Denmark Holland and Germany were represented by purchasers. Internationally known horsemen at the sale were B. J. Alkemade, Hewan-aerdt, Holland; Peter Hansen and Sophus Sorenson, Copenhagen, Denmark; W. Bilberg, Malmö, Sweden; William Mellling, Middlesex, England and Fritz Winkelman, Hamburg, Germany. E. L. Weatherston, Lexington, Ky., represented Isador Schlessinger of Vienna, Austria.

Several nationally known performers were included in the shipment that traveled across the Atlantic. Georgia Volo (3) 2.08½, the fast three year old daughter of Peter Volo, 2.02, was purchased by W. Bilberg for \$5,609. She was owned by W. S. Sinnockson, Salem, N. J. Sorenson obtained Fancy Frisco (4) 2.08½, the black San Francisco 2.07½, colt that was campaigned by the famous Grand Circuit reinsman, Walter R. Cox, for \$2,000 and Khediva Dillon (3) 2.09½, sent to the vendue by the noted Hanover Shoe Farms, Hanover, Pa.; for \$1,300.

JACK TAYLOR, A FORMER NEW BRUNSWICKER, LIVED VERY ECONOMICALLY ON LONG ISLAND

For two and half years Jack Taylor who describes himself as "75 years young," has been tramping slowly over the highways of Long Island. He is now making his headquarters in the year of a rooming house in Long Island City.

For 13 years, Taylor, a native of New Brunswick, Canada, has been living in the open. He says he has never accepted a ride in his saunterings, which have carried him through 13 states and two Canadian provinces. His motto is, "The slower you go the more you see." On these jaunts he is accompanied by his French-Canadian dog, Nappy, who is 7 years young. According to his master, Nappy is so loyal to his origin that he even barks in French.

Mr. Taylor for thirty years was a commercial traveler working out of New York. Then his practice was to live in hotels and always to eat as much as he felt like. To this policy he attributes his physical breakdown that came 13 years ago in Texas. The doctors only gave him a few months to live at that time, he said.

"But I fooled them," added the saunterer. "Fresh air is the meat and wine of life. With a coffee grinder and a few pounds of dried corn I have proved that I can live comfortably on 3 1-2 cents a day. Of course, I could not do strenuous physical work on that diet, but with a fresh, raw egg thrown in for two meals a day I could do any normal manual labor job."

The stroller is a raw egg enthusiast. He says that one raw egg is sustaining and much more digestible than a pound of steak. Ever since he took to the open he has refused to sleep in a house. Cold and inclement weather is more than made up for by the ozone and the invigorating effect he gets from it, he says.
