



PRESIDENT LOGGIE'S REPORT ON THE WORK OF THE LOCAL IMPROVEMENT ASSOCIATION

Following is the report of the Local Improvement Committee submitted by the president, Mr. T. G. Loggie at the annual meeting last evening:

I cannot begin my report without referring to our great loss in the death of Dr. Carleton Allen, one of the founders of the Improvement Association, and its first president. The great interest he always manifested in the work, his cheerful personality and kindly manner will long be remembered by us all. Dr. Allen's name will always be recalled as a promoter of anything for the good of the city, and was rightly respected by all classes in the community.

The season's activities were much upon the lines of preceding years, a large part of the work being the care of public grounds within the city. Work commenced on the 18th. of April with a crew of five men raking and cleaning up, continuing with this until June 1th.

On the 23rd of May, eighty-three elm trees were planted in the streets, principally in the upper part of the city, secured by metal guards. Owing to the wet season and care in planting only two of these young trees died. It has been estimated considerably more than one thousand trees have been planted in the streets of the city by this Association, and it is greatly to be deplored the injury sustained to these trees, principally by the workmen employed in stringing wires. Once more I call the attention of the City Council to the fact that the slashing of the trees is at variance with the regulations of the Council whereby it was arranged by the city and agreed to by the Light and Telephone companies, that before any trimming could be done to the trees, the City Engineer or some one representing him, should be present to superintend. It costs considerable money and time in planting these trees and it is certainly discouraging to the Association to find many of them virtually destroyed.

The College Field

This Association aided the young men at the University in clearing up in the Spring and preparing the College field for their Encoenia Sports.

The care of the Cathedral grounds and "Officers' Square" was undertaken by this Association, on a cost basis, without any charge for wear and tear on machines nor cost of management.

A new band stand was erected opposite the Parliament Building, under the auspices of this Association and in connection with the Dominion Anniversary Celebration. The cost was a little over \$700, one half being paid by the city.

Now that more tourists are annually coming into the city, it seems imperative our work, whether by this As-

sociation, or some department of the city, must be carried on, in order to maintain the beauties of the city and to draw people here to enjoy these beauties.

The Association is indebted to the Provincial Government for a grant of \$500 and the city for \$400, the total income being in all \$1375, expenditures, \$1416.42 leaving a balance due Treasurer of \$42.81.

POTATO PRICES KEEP UP IN AROOSTOOK

Presque Isle, Me., March 5—A cold wave stopped trading on the Aroostook potato market today, there being too few offerings to establish a local price. Reports indicated a firm market and buyers, it is said, were ready to pay \$3.60 a barrel or perhaps more. Indications point to an advance this week. Shipments from storage appear to be increasing, with about 185 carloads going out of the county today.

MANY KILLED IN AN EXPLOSION

Amsterdam, March 6—Twenty persons were killed, 50 were injured and 100 houses were destroyed when a fire works factory exploded at Kodedoes, Java, dispatch from Demarang reported today.

Boston, March 4—The Massachusetts Boxing Commission yesterday suspended Al Mello, Lowell welterweight for three months for fouling Ace Hudkins "the Nebraska wildcat" in their bout here this week.

Mello was at first given a six months' suspension but the Commission announced that in view of the boxer's previous good record, this would be reduced to three months with an additional three months of probation.

Ski line view of Canadian Metropolis
