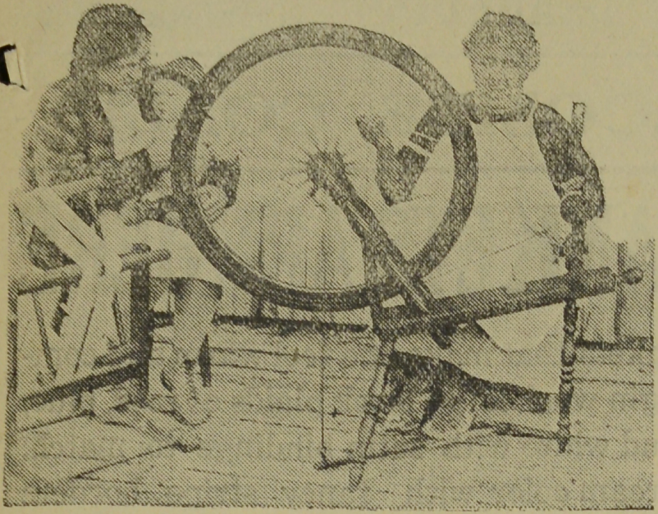


## Modern Woman Uses Spinning Wheel



To many people in the larger communities a spinning wheel is a nice looking antique to set in a corner of the living room, but to Mrs. Philippe Croteau, of the Canton of Figuer, in the parish of Sainte-Therese, in Abitibi—not far from Amos on the transcontinental line of the Canadian National Railways—a spinning wheel has a definite utilitarian purpose. In this particular instance, Mrs. Croteau is providing the material with which to provide warm "oolies" for her grandchild. Mrs. Croteau, widowed head of a large family of boys and girls, and practically penniless, led her thirteen children into Abitibi and undertook to clear 200 acres of forest land. That was in July, 1916. To-day the Croteau farm is 300 acres in extent, with modern houses, barns, garage, good horses, good stock, electric lighting, mechanical aids, a tractor and motor cars, all the result of the courage and industry of a woman who loving her children and born to the land, battled successfully with Nature to win, first, a living, and then a competence. While admitting the modern comforts, Mrs. Croteau believes that yarn spun in the old-fashioned way is best of all and practices her own doctrine. The wonderful achievements of this woman who set out from her home parish near Joliette, twelve years ago with the scanty proceeds of the sale of her old home and a loan of fifty dollars, have been recognized by the Government of the Province of Quebec in presenting to her the highest possible award for agricultural merit.

## WOMEN'S COLUMN

### HAM LOAF

1-2 cup ground boiled ham  
1-2 cup ground cooked pork  
1-2 cup bread crumbs  
1-2 teaspoon pepper  
1 egg  
1-2 cup milk  
2 tablespoons tomato catsup  
Mix meat with the crumbs, pepper, egg mixed with milk and catsup. Pat into a loaf pan and bake 45 minutes in a hot oven (400 degrees F) reducing the heat after 15 minutes to 350 degrees F.

### RAISIN NUT PIE

1 cup sugar  
1 tablespoon butter  
2 eggs  
1-2 teaspoon nutmeg  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1-2 teaspoon cloves  
1 tablespoon vinegar  
1-8 teaspoon salt  
2-3 cup seeded raisins  
1-2 cup chopped nuts  
Cream the sugar and butter and add the beaten egg yolks. Stir in the spices, vinegar, salt, raisins and nuts and cut and fold in the beaten egg whites. Pour into a pie plate lined with pastry and bake at 450 degrees for 10 minutes then at 350 degrees for about 25 minutes longer.

### SOUR CREAM COOKIES

2 cups sugar  
3 eggs  
1 teaspoon soda  
1-2 cup butter and 1-2 cup lard  
1 cup sour cream  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
Mix the sugar and shortening, add the eggs then the soda, baking powder and cream. Add enough flour to stiffen. Flavor with vanilla or lemon. Roll out thin and cut. Bake in a hot oven 10 minutes (375 deg. F.)

### POTATO PANCAKES

6 medium sized potatoes  
1 teaspoon salt  
1-4 teaspoon nutmeg  
2 tablespoons flour  
2 eggs  
1 grated onion  
Grate the raw potatoes, add the yolks and onion. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Bake on a hot griddle and serve with marmalade or currant jelly.

### CHEESE CAKE

Plain pastry  
1 cup cottage cheese  
1-2 cup cream  
4 eggs  
2 tablespoons sugar  
1-4 teaspoon salt  
Line pan with pastry. Mix other ingredients, folding in stiffly beaten egg whites last. Glaze crust with slightly beaten egg white and bake in hot oven (450 degrees F) ten minutes, then twenty minutes in a moderate oven (350 degrees F) instead of partly crushed zwieback or cornflakes crumbs may be used.

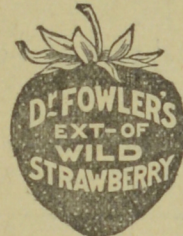
### APPLE AND DATE SALAD

Mix together one and one half cups of diced peeled apples (squeezing over the fruit a few drops of lemon juice to keep it from discoloring) half a cup of chopped, pitted dates one fourth cup of chopped nut meats one small cup of finely chopped shredded cabbage and two minced canned pimentos. Moisten with mayonnaise dressing and serve in lettuce cups.

### CELERY SANDWICHES

Broil one slice of bacon for each sandwich chop and add an equal amount of chopped celery. Blend well with mayonnaise. Split and butter tiny hot biscuits and fill with the mixture and a leaf of lettuce.

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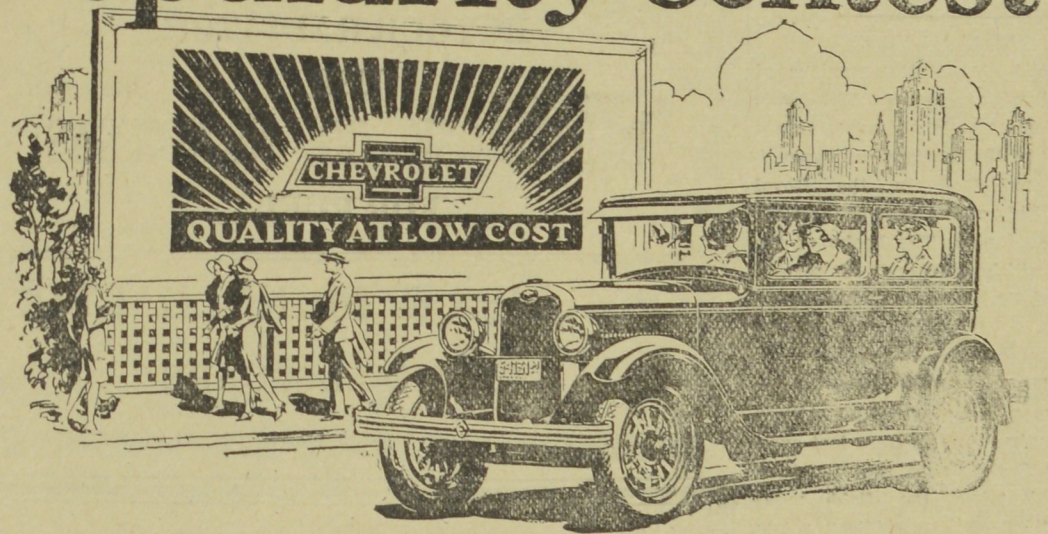
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
