

HON. MR. TILLEY SAYS THAT THE IMMIGRATION POLICY OF THE GOVERNMENT IS WRONG

Terming the Canadian Immigration policy inadequate and entirely wrong, the Hon. Leonard P. D. Tilley, LL. B., K. C., M. P. P., of St. John, N. B., son of Sir Samuel Leonard Tilley, one of the Fathers of the Confederation today directed a pointed attack on the present Immigration system of Canada.

"The policy adopted and in force today is entirely wrong," the New Brunswick statesman declared today in an interview accorded exclusively to the Chronicle-Telegraph. "The Dominion and Provincial Governments alone should handle the Immigration problem and the yearly influx of immigrants to this country, and not private agencies."

Pointing out that he desired to leave all politics out of the question, the Hon. Mr. Tilley stated that according to the Statistical Bureau of Ottawa, Canada's population increased by something over 100,000 people last year. And yet, according to the Trade and Labor unions throughout the Dominion there is no shortage in

trade that cannot be filled by Canadians.

"Why," asked the Hon. Mr. Tilley, "are immigrants brought into Canada, particularly a class of labor which will only help to make it more difficult for native sons to obtain positions in offices or on farms?"

Only Class Wanted.

The only class of immigrant, he stated, that was at present needed in Canada and the only class which the Dominion is in search of is a man and his family for farming purposes. The English farm settlement Board is helping out along these lines, but their efforts are practically useless in the case of a man who has never had farming experience and naturally tires of farm life. "A man who has a good farm in Britain is not going to leave it for uncertainties here," said the Hon. Mr. Tilley.

"My suggestion for this," he continued, "is that the Dominion Government, through its Immigration and Agricultural Departments, should unite with the Governments of each and every Province in the Dominion

and form an Immigration Board which would work in unison with the Immigration Departments of each Province."

This Board, he pointed out, could regulate the amount of labor imported, and more important, it would distribute them evenly throughout the Dominion.

The Hon. Mr. Tilley stated that in his opinion there are no Provinces in the Dominion which have been overlooked as much as have the Maritimes. With wonderful possibilities in every line, and particularly in mixed farming, this part of Canada has been overlooked almost completely, he said. "It is time that the Immigration Department wakened up to the fact that there are wonderful openings in the Maritimes, instead of flooding the western provinces with useless unskilled labor."

Farm Training Schools.

Turning to the question of Canadian migration to the United States, the Hon. Mr. Tilley pointed out that the constant stream into the south was due to the fact that there are not sufficient training schools, particularly farm training schools, for Canada's younger generation.

"Every Province," he pointed out, "has several vocational schools. There are 4 or 5 good agricultural colleges in Canada which are excellent as far

as they go. But where is the elementary agricultural training lure? There are thousands of rural schools in Canada. But do they teach agriculture at these schools? They do not. They are educated, on the contrary, so that they are inspired with a desire for office and city life."

As a remedy for this, the Hon. Mr. Tilley stated, the Dominion Government should financially assist the Boards of Education of every Province to create agricultural primary school and that these schools be intensified in every manner possible to create a love of up-to-date, scientific farming.

Twelve Months' Course.

Returning to the subject of Immigration, it was pointed out that if immigrants must be brought out from the British Isles, then training schools should be established both in Canada and Great Britain to instruct them in agricultural work, at least 12 months being devoted to their education. The bringing of thousands of untrained men to Canada comes very close to being criminal, he pointed out, as hundreds of these men become stranded after landing here, particularly those who come to the harvest. "If men must be brought for the harvest," he said, "then arrangements should be made to ship them."

"Co-operative action between the Federal and Provincial Governments," he said, "is the only solution."

The government of Ontario the City Council, the Board of Trade and the directors of the Canadian National Exhibition will co-operate with the Maritime Provinces Association in welcoming and entertaining the visitors from the Maritimes.
