TO BE WELL EQUIPPED.

Commander Richard E. Byrd's wisdom in getting a short wave radio transmitter and a receiving set for every dog sled and airplane in his South Polar expedition is obvious.

Amundsen, Guibaud and their No-bile rescue crew might have been saved by radio. They were out of communication with the rest of the world after flying north of Bear Island. One hundred and fifty miles of sea lay between their last known position and the southern tip of Spitzbergen. The vessels that took up the hunt for Amundsen's big seaplane needed more precise information than that it was somewhere in a vast polar area.

Every man in the Byrd expedition will be educated to send and receive code by one-hour daily lessons on the southern voyage. Hence, if the man designated as operator in any party is unable because of injuries to operate the set the others in the group can call aid or report progress.

Included in Byrd's \$75,000 worth of radio equipment are 20 transmitters and 26 receivers.

The common sense of adequate and dependable radio communication between all parties of the expedition at all times will appeal to the thoughtful.

While on a recent visit to Prince Albert, Premier King presented the Royal Humane Society's certificate to Vernon Johnson of Big River and a silver collar to Prince, the leader of his dog team.
