

VICTORY BONDS  
TO BE RETIRED  
ON MONDAY

Heavy Subscriptions  
Were Made in Freder-  
icton and York Coun-  
ty, to the Original  
Victory Loan.

Federal Government Victory Bonds to the amount of \$53,000,000 fall due on Monday and will be paid off in cash at the branches of the various chartered banks. These bonds bear interest at the rate of five per cent and accrued interest for the period of six months will be due and payable at the same time.

When this bond issue was made the people of Fredericton and York County subscribed liberally but since that many have cashed in on their holdings or converted them into automobiles and other securities. It is therefore difficult to make an estimate of the amount to be paid here on Monday, but it is safe to say that it will run well into six figures. Such a windfall coming at this season of the year should give a stimulus to business.

The bonds to be retired on Monday were first issued in 1918, just before the close of the Great War, and a re-bundling issue of part of the amount was made in October, 1923.

TAXI DRIVERS  
WERE FINED FOR  
SPEED OFFENCE

Case of Two Taxi Men  
Argued This Morning  
— Magistrate Limer-  
ick Rules Men Disre-  
garded Safety Laws.

Two Marysville taxi drivers were  
fined \$10 and costs with the option  
of a thirty day jail sentence when they  
appeared before Police Magistrate  
Limerick this morning to answer to  
a charge laid against them by Harry  
Arnold, town marshal of Marysville,  
for exceeding the speed limit on the  
highway bridge at Marysville. The of-  
fence occurred on the evening of Octo-  
ber 6th, and Mr. Arnold stated that  
the two men were driving their cars  
at thirty miles an hour over the  
bridge. Both charges were made sepa-  
rately by the informant but it was  
agreed to allow the evidence heard  
to apply to both cases as both of-  
fences occurred at the same time. F.  
H. Peters was counsel for the defence  
while Mr. Arnold conducted his own  
prosecution.

There were two witnesses for the  
prosecution and the two taxi drivers

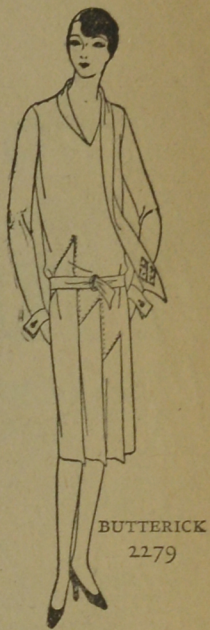
