MOCKING BIRD IS VISITOR TO N. S. COLLEGE

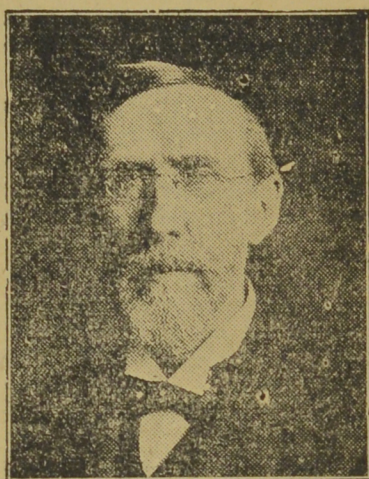

\$50,000 FOR FOLIO

The folio is known as the Wantage-Crawford copy, and was located by Sir Sidney Lee in the library of Lady Wantage.

FRASER STOCK TO BE LISTED AT MONTREAL

Montreal, Jan. 14—It is understood that application has been made for the listing of Fraser common shares on the Montreal Exchange. Much attention is being directed to this stock by reason of the fact that the 7 per cent preferred shares now listed on the Montreal Stock Exchange are convertible into three shares of no par value common for one share of preferred.

Transactions in the preferred stock have taken place in the last few days at as high as 175 and the preferred closed yesterday at 170 which is equivalent to 56½ for the new common.

Inasmuch as the preferred shares have been called for redemption at 105 and accrued dividend and will cease to bear dividend after January 30, it is obvious with the quotation of 160 to 170 for the preferred that none of it will be turned in for cash redemption but will rather be converted into common.

The Montreal Trust Company now has the new Fraser common shares available for immediate delivery and it is emphasized that Fraser preferred should be presented to the Montreal Trust for exchange into common by those shareholders who wish to convert their preferred shares.

Senate Meeting.

At the meeting of the Senate in the headquarters of the Board of School Trustees it was decided to appoint an assistant professor of forestry for that department of the university. Permission was also granted the Associated Alumni to erect a suitable tablet commemorating the first graduates of U. N. B. to receive degrees. This event was on February 21, 1928, and it was likely that the unveiling of the tablet would be held on the 100th anniversary of that important day, it was announced following the session.
