JOE LAMB WAS WITH MAROONS IN WORKOUT

Former New Brunswicker Filled in For Bill Phillips—No to Use Lamb Saturday Night.

Montreal, Jan. 12—Joe Lamb, Royal Bank hockey star, was out practicing with the Montreal Maroons at the Forum today, but that does not mean that he will immediately be signed up. Manager Eddie Gerard said this morning that Lamb would eventually sign a Maroon form, but he would not do it until at least after the Bank League has finished its scheduled season.

The real reason for the Maroons asking Lamb to turn out at practice with them today, he added, was to fill in for Bill Phillips, who is suffering from an injury to his back. The absence of Phillips on the ice in practice makes it rather awkward for scrimmage work, so Lamb was out to fill in the gap. But there is no idea of having Lamb on the line-up Saturday when the Pittsburgh Pirates play the Gerardmen.

In connection with the injury to Phillips, it is now stated that he has torn ligaments, and Manager Gerard said he would be out of the game Saturday. That will make the Maroons two men short, as Siebert is also out of the game, having been automatically suspended when he got his third major penalty on Saturday last against Boston. It is rather an unfortunate "break" for the locals, losing these two valuable players at the same time, but they are determined to go out and show that even with things against them they can avenge themselves on the Pirates who won in their last meeting.

Odie Cleghorn's gang of Corsairs play at home tonight and then en-bain for Montreal. They should be in tomorrow night or Saturday morning at the least.

HARNESS NEWS SHOWS 1927 RACE SEASON RECORDS

Fred Medium, Now Owned in P. E. I. Won 12 Races on Canadian Tracks.

Boston, Jan. 12—Fred Medium and Millie W. were the only light harness performers that were credited with 12 races in last season's light harness meets. Fred Medium's races were over the Canadian tracks. Millie W. swept all before her in the Bay State and Drange Country Circuits until she met Al Bingen in her 11th race at Middletown, N. Y. The series of races between Millie W. and Wayne Hal were one of the features of the Summer circuit.

Five horses were credited with winning 11 races last year. They were the trotters Axdale and Jean Peters and the pacers Dan R., Jimmy Strathmore and Peter Belmont. The last named was raced in Maine and is by Peter Vonla.

Maine also contributed a horse to the four trotters which won 10 races in 1927. Its leader is Luke Bell by Atlantic Express. He made a record of 2.06½ at Rochester, N. H. The other trotters in this group are Bugle Call by Guy Axworthy, Peter Frisco and the three-year-old Leon Worthy by Edgar Worthy.

Fusiliers Took 5 to 1 Game From Sussex Last Night

Colts on Short End of 5 to 1 Score — Keating and Clark Secure 5 Tallies—Both Injured Before Game Finished — Penalties Thick — 1800 Fans See Game.

Saint John, Jan. 13—The Fusiliers hurled a load of shrapnel at the Sussex Colts in their battle at the Arena, Friday night, and when the smoke cleared after 60 minutes of play the boys from the Dairy Town were on the short end of a 5 to 1 score. Between 1,500 and 1,800 fans saw the battle.

Both teams deserve a great hand for the game they played. Despite the fact that all chances for the first section of the league were out of their grasp and many of the dopsters predicted a general lying-down on the job, they tore in from the first bell and with the exception of a lull in the last stanza, never eased up. It was the roughest game on local ice this season. To keep the game in check Referee Drummie dished out penalties right and left and towards the end of the first period had to call both teams into a conference and read the riot act.

Jack Keating and Aldie Clark, the "Robin Hoods" of the game, who scored the five tallies, were both put out of commission. Clark was put to the boards by Lutz about half way through the first period and was out of the game for the remainder of it. In the second stanza Keating got his, when H. Radcliffe laid him away with his elbow during a mixup. Jack was forced to rest for the remainder of this stanza, but resumed play in the third.

JACK SHARKEY AND TOM HEENEY FIGHT TO DRAW

12 Rounds to a Draw at Madison Garden Last Night—Surprise to Hub Fans—Decision Boomed.

Madison Square Garden, New York, Jan. 13—Jack Sharkey, of Boston, and Tom Heeney, champion of New Zealand, fought twelve rounds to a draw here tonight. The result left in doubt the qualifications of either heavyweight to contend for the title now held by Gene Tunney. Heeney's showing was a surprise to the fans who had made the Boston man a heavy favorite.

Seventeen thousand spectators heartily booed the decision in the belief that the man from down under had the edge on points.

Lou Bogash, veteran light heavyweight from Bridgeport, Conn., fought to a draw with "Sunny Jim" Williams California negro, in a 10-round preliminary to the Sharkey-Heeney heavyweight match. Both weighed 170.

In a four round preliminary, Larry Creighton, 184, of Danbury, Conn., won the decision from Mike Sankowitz, 189½, of Patterson, N. J.

The ten round semi-final resulted in a victory for Joe Zkyra, young Dayton, Ohio, light heavyweight over Yalle Okun, of New York. Zkyra, the aggressor all the way, had trouble in penetrating Okun's defence at first but battered and cut the New Yorker in the last few rounds with a slashing attack. Okun tired and was on the verge of a knockout in the tenth round. Both weighed 173½ pounds.

BATHURST TAKES LEAD BY 8-0 WIN OVER NEWCASTLE

Bathurst, Jan. 13—Bathurst tonight defeated Newcastle eight to nothing jumping to the leading position of this section, Newcastle made their initial appearance on Bathurst ice tonight as members of the Northern N. FANS WONDER AT HORNSBY'S TRADE TO BRAVES

Fans Find it Hard to Believe That Star Second Sacker Is Traded—No Apparent Reason For It.

New York, Jan. 13—The baseball world remains incredulous, where the trade of Rogers Hornsby to the Boston Braves is concerned.

A nation of fans, who accepted without undue concern the whitewashing of those accused in last winter's scandals, simply will not believe the star second baseman, the most valuable player on the New York Giants, a leader on the attack and a skilful captain on the defensive, was sent to a lowly second division club just to prevent him from attempting unduly to take over the management of the team now led by John J. McGraw.

Speaking for the Giants, President Charles A. Stoneham, today said that Hornsby was sent to the Braves in exchange for Francis X. Hogan and Jimmy Welch "in order to avoid any future conflicts in the management of the club and for no other reason."

Supplementing that statement Secretary James Tierney asserted that no trouble between McGraw and Hornsby over the management of the Giants had as yet arisen.

"We just wanted to insure ourselves against trouble in the future," Tierney told the United Press.

"It being the desire of Harrington not to leave New England, he will finish his season with the Bruins, unless some complication appears that will make this impossible.
