HOPE TO ADJUST
MATTER OF WATER
AND M. ELECTRIC

City Council to Take
Steps to Have Closer
Connection Between
Power House and the
Pumping Station.

The question of water pumps and the connection of the Maritime Electric with the operations of the city water system was brought up at the committee meeting of the City Council last evening and discussed at length. Alderman Moses Mitchell introduced the matter before the council in conjunction with the failure of the lighting system on Sunday night which necessitated the use of the oil pump at the pumping station for the water supply.

When the electric system failed on Sunday night, according to Alderman Mitchell, the water pumps also failed to function, being electrically operated by the Maritime Electric. An oil pump was brought into use and was operated for about four hours, until a time when the current could be returned to the pumps. It was Mr. Mitchell's move that some arrangement should be made between the pumping station and the Maritime

CITY MAY ADOPT
NEW ELECTRICAL
SAFETY CODE

N. B. Fire Marshall
Brought Matter Be-
fore Council Last
Night—Other Provin-
ces Favor Code.

A delegation acting in the interests of the Canadian Electrical Code, appeared before the city council last evening, and asked that the council consider the adoption of the rules of this Code for use in the city of Fredericton. The Code, according to H. H. McLellan, New Brunswick Fire Marshall, who presented the matter before the members of the council, has in its policies the curtailing of fires and death, caused by defective and hazardous electrical wiring, which is prevalent throughout this province. The Code, a national one, having been copied from the National Electrical Code at present in vogue in the U. S. with effective results, has not yet been fully established in Canada, but will, in the course of a short time receive this rite was the optimistic opinion of Mr. McLellan.

Provides Examination.

Among other things provided for in this "electric safety code" is the enforced examination of electricians be-

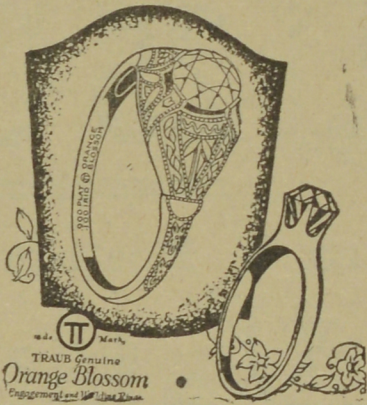
