## FIVE MARITIMERS HAVE STAYED AT LEAST YEAR IN NATIONAL HOCKEY LOOP

**Les Lowther First to Make Trip — Roach, Stuart, Jackson, Cahill All Up for While — Joe Lamb Gets His Choice — Will He Stay**

Moncton, Feb. 6.—To date five Maritime hockey players have actually sojourned for at least one season in the speedy company of the National Hockey League. Lester Lowther of Amherst was the first of these players to make the moneyed trip, and played with the Toronto Tecumsehs in the season 1914-15. Mickey Roach of Grace Bay left the colliery town and attended night school in Boston where he developed into an amateur star. Later he became attached to the Hamilton Club in the National Hockey League and subsequently went with the New York Americans. William R. Stuart of Amherst followed joining St. Patrick's and for a couple of seasons he was hailed as the most promising prospect unearthed. Stuart stayed with St. Patrick's for three seasons and then went to Boston Bruins. He has since gone to Minneapolis. Stanton Jackson also of Amherst followed Stuart a season later. He was with St. Patrick's and later accompanied Stuart to Boston where he made a splendid name for himself. Subsequently he went with New Haven and then London. This year he has been classed as the best defence man in the Can. Pro. League. Charles Cahill of Summerside stepped out of amateur hockey after playing with the Summerside Crystals and joined Art Ross and his Bruins. Cahill was retained for a year but was then sent to New Haven for more experience.

There have been other men tried out for big league positions. Geo. Carroll of Moncton made more than one appearance for the Boston Bruins although originally signed up by the Montreal Maroons. Vernon Doncaster of Moncton signed a contract with the same club but did not remain in Montreal. He required more seasoning and no minor pro. league was operating at the time. Simon Higgins of Westville was given a try out by the same club.

Paddy Nolan of New Glasgow had the opportunity of gaining some experience in professional company but Nolan could not stand the hard grind of professional training and was permitted to return to the Maritime Provinces. Ted Stackhouse of Wolfville also sought big league honors and hung with St. Patrick's during the season they won the championship 1922 but he was not used to any great extent.

Back in the days when the Cobalt League with its wads of coin, raided the old National organizations, Chester Gregory and I believe Mike Murphy endeavored to find playing positions, but they only remained a short time and returned East. They rejoined the New Glasgow club as amateurs and their presence on the team caused the investigation that resulted in the disruption of the old Nova Scotia Amateur Hockey Association.

Joe Lamb of Sussex will be about the sixth regular player to be signed in a big league hockey camp. In Montreal the scouts have had an abundance of opportunity to view his work. His contract has been signed, sealed and delivered and he

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
