

International Co-operation In Turkish Oil Production

The Standard Oil Company to Join Hands With European Groups—Ninety Thousand Square Miles of Rich Lands in Irak to be Developed—May End Bitter Rivalry in Near East Oil Production.

LONDON, Aug. 8—American oil interests, headed by the Standard Oil Company of New York and New Jersey, and the an-American Petroleum Transport Company have agreed to participate in the Turkish Petroleum company equally with the Royal Dutch Shell, Anglo-Persian and French groups, it was understood today. Ninety thousand square miles of the richest oil fields in Irak will be developed as a result of the agreement, it was said.

The agreement marks the first large-scale international cooperation in oil production and may lead, it is thought to further negotiations, to end the bitter rivalry in near eastern oil productions.

A Hurricane Expected

Miami, Fla., Aug. 8—The United States weather bureau early today hoisted hurricane warnings from Palm Beach to Daytona. The tropical disturbance was reported centering at 5 a. m. off the coast near Palm Beach. Daytona should feel the brunt of the hurricane later in the day, the bureau said.

CHAMBERLAIN ORDERED TO TAKE A REST

British Foreign Secretary is Suffering from an Attack of Bronchial Pneumonia.

London, Aug. 7—Sir Austen Chamberlain, British Secretary for Foreign Affairs has been ordered to take a complete rest in order that he may recover completely from the attack of bronchial pneumonia under which he has been suffering.

This became known today when an official communique was issued designating Lord Cushendun as acting Foreign Secretary. Lord Cushendun will represent Great Britain at the September meeting of council and of the assembly of the League of Nations. The signing of the Kellogg Pact in Paris late this month was not mentioned in the communique, but it is thought certain that Cushendun's signature will appear on that document.

The communique said:

"The King has approved the appointment of Lord Cushendun as acting Foreign Secretary during the temporary absence of Sir J. Austen Chamberlain. Owing to his recent illness, Secretary Chamberlain has been ordered to take a complete rest before resuming his official duties. Lord Cushendun will also take Mr. Chamberlain's place as chief of the British representatives at the pending meetings of the Council and the Assembly of the League of Nations."

On Motor Trip

A party composed of Sheriff and Mrs. J. B. Hawthorne and Mr. and Mrs. Chester Stultz of Elgin, Alberta County left today on a motor trip to Boston to be absent about ten days. Mr. and Mrs. Stultz who were married yesterday at Elgin arrived here this morning on their honeymoon and set out immediately for Boston. Mr. Stultz is a cousin of Mrs. Hawthorne.

ITALIAN SUB. TOWED BACK TO NAVAL BASE

Had on Board the Bodies of 2 Officers and 25 Men Who Perished in Accident.

Rome, Aug. 8—Its black-draped flag halfmasted, the submarine F-14 was towed back to Pola naval base today with the bodies of the two officers and 25 men who perished in it after the little ship struck a destroyer off Brioni Island in the Adriatic sea.

It has been announced previously that 31 in all were in the ship, including apprentices, but a revised list today gave the smaller figure.

An official navy department statement gave a brief, tragic summary of the manner in which the F-14's crew was found.

At 6.40 P. M. yesterday after 34 hours since it sank, the F 14 was raised to the surface and inspected internally at once.

"Of the 27 aboard—officers, crew and apprentices—not one survived. Part perished by drowning the others were asphyxiated poisoned by chlorine gas fumes from the batteries of the ship.

JOE WRIGHT, JR. LOSES SINGLES

Amsterdam, Aug. 7—Joe Wright, of Toronto, holder of the Diamond Sculls, was eliminated from further competition for single sculling honors at the Olympiad today by David Collet, of Britain, an old rival. Otherwise the result of the Canadian activities in important trials at the games today were highly satisfactory. Though Wright lost in the singles, he partnered with Jack Guest, his club-mate, to defeat decisively the French pair in the doubles. The Canadian eight-oared crew, Toronto Argonauts won by a length from Poland.

PREMIER KING ON THE STUMP IN THE WEST

Replies to Questions Put by Hon. R. B. Bennett During His Maritime Tour.

Davidson, Sask., Aug. 7—Premier Mackenzie King in a speech of his western tour here today replied to questions put by Hon. R. B. Bennett, Conservative leader. Mr. Bennett, the Prime Minister said, was anxious to know to what port the government was directing the ship of state, and what chart and compass were guiding the voyage. The ship of state, replied Mr. King, "is safely anchored in the port of unity, prosperity and amity."

"I have designated the port for my anxious friend, let him no longer be afraid," continued the Prime Minister. "May I tell him that my chart is the development of the British constitution, throughout the entire course of its history, and my compass is the guiding principle of responsible government."

Mr. King's address today was delivered in the constituency of Long Lake, which is represented in the House of Commons by J. Fred Johnston, Deputy Speaker.

Premier King declared that when the government came into office there was owing to Canada sums totalling \$172, 231,066, which were obligations incurred by governments in the course of the war, but not met in the years following, or which were the result of loans made by "our predecessors" to Rumania and Greece. "On these loans so much as interest payments were not being made when we took office," he said.

Since the present government came into power, aided by the financial skill of Hon. P. C. Larkin, the Finance Department has received from the British government sums amounting to \$3,450,290, from Belgium, \$8,165,295 from France \$6,694,427, from Rumania \$5,273,290, and from Greece \$2,793,498.

WILL INSPECT FREDERICTON POST OFFICE

Saint John, Aug. 8—Hon. Peter J. Veniot, Postmaster General, accompanied by J. L. Gaboury, of Ottawa, Deputy Postmaster General, arrived in the city from Moncton by motor on Tuesday afternoon in connection with an inspection of the post offices in New Brunswick.

This morning the Postmaster General and the Deputy will inspect the Saint John post office and at 10 o'clock they will make an inspection of the office at Fairville. From Fairville the Minister and party will motor to Black's Harbor, thence to St. George, St. Andrews and St. Stephen, where similar inspections will be carried out.

On Thursday morning, Dr. Veniot will motor to Fredericton and, following the inspection of the Fredericton post office, they will continue on up the river towards the northern part of the province.

Yesterday afternoon on his arrival in the city, the Postmaster General was in conference with local post office officials in his suite at the Admiral Beatty Hotel.

SLATER TO BE COMPENSATED BY THE GOVT.

Innocent Man Convicted of Murder Will Get \$30,000.

CONAN DOYLE HELPED HIM

Will Accept the British Govt's Offer of Compensation.

London, Aug. 8—Oscar Slater will receive more than \$1,000 for every year he served in prison, wrongfully for the murder of a woman.

Recently he was freed, through an official court order from prison, after having served twenty years for murder. Slater always has insisted he was innocent of the charge and recently Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, creator of Sherlock Holmes, interested himself in the case and brought about the evidence that resulted in Slater's freedom.

Then the government, as compensation for the incorrect punishment, decided to compensate Slater with \$30,000.

Slater yesterday decided to accept the government's compensation offer.

AL SMITH TO DEBATE WITH DR. STRATTON

The Premier said that, while he had been fully acquainted with the objects of the tour, it was not until he had seen the young men and women, and had personally chatted with them, that he fully realized the advertising asset to Canada of such a tour. He pointed out that some 250,000 pupils of the British Isles, had entered into the contest, which was composed of numerous questions on the Dominions, 75 per cent. of which were pertaining to Canada, and it was from this large body of applicants that the party of 50, who are now touring Canada, was selected.

Miss Lauder is at her camp in Maine and Tunney also is at the Lauder camp. A statement came from the Lauder Maine home yesterday that Miss Lauder would neither confirm nor deny the report.

NOT IN ACCORD WITH VIEWS OF MACDONALD

Old Country View is that Canada Has Right to Decide on the Kind of Emigrants.

London, Aug. 8—Ramsay MacDonald's criticism of Canada's attitude of insisting upon taking only the emigrants she needs, finds little sympathy, even in labor circles here.

The attitude of most authorities is that Canada has an inalienable right to decide what type of men she wants, but that there are too many red tape restrictions imposed by the Canadian Government and that these restrictions hinder the flow to Canada of the British emigrants whom Canada wants.

Labor's attitude is that Canadian labor conditions should not be imperilled by any indiscriminate flow of workers from Britain.

Egg Yield Last Week Was 59.4 Per Cent—King's County Hen Heading for the 300 Mark.

The 190 birds in the New Brunswick Egg Laying Contest, which is conducted at the Dominion Experimental Station, Fredericton, laid 791 eggs for the week which brings the total to date up to 29,090 eggs with 29959.2 points. The production for the week namely 59.4 per cent lower than for the previous week but 10.9 per cent higher than for the same week in the previous year.
