

# HOWIE MORINZ HAS CLOSE SHAVE ELECTRIC STORM

Montreal, Aug. 7—Howie Morenz has weathered many rough and tough hockey battles since he donned the uniform of Les Canadiens five years ago. The speed merchant has been dealing in knocks and bumps in one of the roughest pastimes with great success and has received no injuries of serious consequence for those five years, not during the number before while in the amateur ranks. Howie seems to be able to evade injuries without evading the rough going.

But probably the closest shave "the Stratford Streak" has had from injury occurred on Saturday afternoon. And it wasn't in a game having anything in common with the roughness of hockey. A dash of lightning, during the thunderstorm on Saturday came dangerously close to ending the very successful life of the great Canadian player and at the same time costing the Canadian Hockey Club about \$50,000 worth of the best hockey material available.


## At Forest Hills

This narrow escape occurred when Morenz was taking part in a golf match at Forest Hills. The players were overtaken by the downpour and storm which broke around 4 o'clock. Just as the hockey star completed a stroke, lightning struck—close and sharp. Morenz's club, poised in mid air must have attracted the lightning for the wooden shaft of the instrument was badly shattered and the player staggered from the impact. Had Morenz been holding a steel shafted club in his hands the result might—and probably would—have been decidedly serious.

Little Tony Angelo, Italian caddy who considers it something of an honor to carry the clubs of hockey celebrities like Morenz, Aurel Joliat, Sprague Cleghorn and others who do their golf at Forest Hills tells of wanting to dash away for cover when lightning began to flash and the thunder to crash but says he remained on the job because he is an admirer of the Canadian ace. "I sure was scared when I saw the club busted" says Tony. "But it didn't seem to scare Howie a bit. He seemed to forget it just like he would a bump in a hockey game. I took another mid-iron from his bag and gave it to him and he finished the round with a dandy score. He's sure one game guy."

## SOUR CREAM COOKED FROSTING

- 1 cup sour cream
  - 1 cup powdered sugar
  - 1 cup chopped nuts


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# SECOND DAY OF TENNIS TOURNAY SEES THRILLERS

# SWIMMER PULLS TWO BOATLOADS

Marshfield, Mass., Aug. 6—Wearing handcuffs and with his ankles shackled, George Harpy, long-distance swimmer, covered one-half mile in 11 minutes off Oak Bluffs yesterday.
