THE C. P. R. TO ERECT A FINE  
NEW HOTEL AT DIGBY, N. S.;  
WILL BE RIGHT UP TO DATE

Montreal, Jan. 6.—Digby, N. S., is to have a new hotel. It is to be completed in time for the tourist season on next year and will then replace the pines which for many years has been an important feature of this tourist service of the Dominion Atlantic Railway. The announcement was made today at Windsor Station the headquarters of the Canadian Pacific of which system the Dominion Atlantic is a part, by Mr. Grant Hall, President of latter railway and it was stated that the projection of the new hotel at this time while badly needed on account of the steady development of tourist traffic over the line of the Dominion Atlantic between Halifax, Digby and Yarmouth was an indication of the company's confidence in the further extension of the tourist traffic of the maritime provinces.

The new hotel, for which an appropriations has already had been approved by Mr. E. W. Beatty will be erected adjacent to the present "Pines" which in accommodation and equipment has outgrown the business offering. It will be a four story building of approximately 100 rooms nearly all with baths.

Its architecture will be along colonial lines, and construction will be completed fireproof and of concrete and terra cotta tile with stucco exterior trimmed with rubble stone and with a slate surfaced roof. Local material will be used throughout as far as possible. The front of the building will overlook the wide vista of Digby Basin and the general style of the building has been designed to fit into the contour of the surrounding grounds and to take advantage of the views of the countryside as well as to allow for future extension. Modern decorative ideas will prevail throughout. On the ground floor will be the rotunda and a wide lounge looking out over the basin. Open fireplaces and a beamed ceiling will be features and directly connecting will be check rooms, telephones and the usual offices, while access to the main dining room will be provided by means of an

easy stairway going down. The large and airy dining room with kitchens and offices be in the basement. On the ground floor will also be ladies rest rooms and other facilities and some bedrooms all which will be commodious in size and decorated in modern summer hotel style. Like the bath-rooms they will be fitted with every modern convenience.

## A Swimming Pool.

In connection with the hotel and nearby a large swimming pool will be constructed and this will be screened from the wind by plateglass screens something after the style of the famous pools at Banff and Lake Louise. A recreation pavilion will also be erected close to the pool providing dressing rooms, a large dancing floor and garage for the accommodation of tourists. A boat wharf and boat houses will be built on the shore of the basin on the hotel property. A new bowling green will be constructed and many improvements will be effected on the present golf course.

The building of the hotel in conjunction with the erection of the "Lord Nelson" at Halifax will be an important step forward in tourist traffic development in the maritimes. The growth of summer time traffic from all parts of America over the Dominion Atlantic has created an urgent need for both of these hotels. George E. Graham, General Manager of the Dominion Atlantic here in connection with the appropriations for 1928 stated here today that while the tourist business visiting the Annapolis Valley and the evangeline country of late years had more than warranted this extension of the hotel facilities of the maritimes, the result undoubtedly would be a further increase in traffic from the eastern United States and from Quebec and Ontario.

The erection of the new Digby hotel he said again reflected the company's faith in the future of the maritimes and would stimulate the activities of the maritimes people toward the development of the latent possibilities of their own part of Canada.
