GOVERNOR AL SMITH HEARS PLEA FOR CLEMENCY FOR MRS. RUTH SNYDER AND HENRY GRAY

Albany, Jan. 5—Gov. Smith listened for two hours today while lawyers tried to convince him that he ought to stay the execution of Mrs. Ruth Snyder and Henry Judd Gray, scheduled for a week from today, but he gave them little encouragement.

Toward the end of the hearing he joined in the argument with considerable heat interspersed with dry humor. He delivered himself of decided opinions concerning psychoanalysis, the relative values of St. Paul and the New York Legislature as interpreters of the law, and the duties of a public official sworn to see that the law is carried out.

When all sides of the argument had been presented the Governor ended the session abruptly, merely announcing, "well, the hearing's over," and walking out of the room.

Except Memorandum.

The lawyers tried to convince the executive that while Mrs. Snyder and Gray had unquestionably killed the woman's husband, they may not have been able to withhold their hands.

Although it is not customary for the Governor to make any statement after the clemency hearing, he did issue a memorandum today concerning his refusal to override the courts in the case of Charles J. Doran, Albany gangster, sentenced to die in the electric chair tonight. For this reason it was believed that within the next few days he would issue a memorandum concerning today's hearing, explaining in detail his reasons for whatever action or inaction he may decide on.

Edgar F. Hazelton and Dana Wallace entered their pleas for Mrs. Snyder before a crowded chamber. Hazelton told the Governor that he had only recently discovered that in her youth Mrs. Snyder suffered from a serious sunstroke and a serious fall. He said psychiatrists had advised him that because of this she was all the rest of her life subject to alternating moods of great joy and great depression.

"Twilight Zone."

"She was subject to recurring attacks," he said, "and mentally she existed in a twilight zone of limited responsibility which can be explained by the new psychiatry, but which is not recognized by the older school of medicine on whose teachings our present definition of insanity is based."

He said that while doctors of the older school had found both Mrs. Snyder and Gray sane, they were psychopathic cases and should be dealt with as such instead of as criminals. He asked for a stay of 30 days in which psychiatrists and psychoanalysts might study their impulses and see if they were not so emotionally diseased as to render them incapable of doing right even though they could distinguish between right and wrong. Hazelton asked for a stay on the basis of "human mercy to a splendid wife and mother," and because he said that capital punishment was due to be abolished soon any way.

The principal address for Gray was made by William Millard, who described Gray as "a poor human mannequin in the control of that tragic and abnormal woman, Ruth Snyder."

Asks 30-Day Stay.

Millard also asked for a 30-day stay of execution and added that if this were granted commutation of sentence to life imprisonment would be sought.

Dist. Atty. Newcombe of Queens County, prosecutor at the trial, replied briefly to defense counsel, saying that he had sought in vain for any extenuating circumstances which would justify leniency. He also said playing a large part in the game, that the picture of Mrs. Snyder as a good wife and mother prior to the

crime was not borne out by the facts and concluded with the recommendation that justice be permitted "to run its course."

Gov. Smith spoke bitingly to both defense attorneys of "this psychosis stuff" and this "twilight zone business." "Why," he said finally, "if what you are telling me was any argument, anyone who wanted to do a murder could just do a few other foolish things first and escape punishment altogether. I must ask you to stick to the law."

Mothers Present.

"St. Paul says," Hazelton replied, "that 'the letter of the law killeth but the spirit of the law—'"

The Governor interrupted the quotation.

"The Legislature of the State of New York," he drawled, "has a different opinion, and the Legislature is more modern interpreter of the law than St. Paul."

The two persons most vitally interested with the outcome of the hearings Mrs. Snyder and Gray, were not present, remaining in their Sing Sing cells, but the mothers of both sat facing the Governor with tear dimmed eyes.

N. H. L. HOCKEY

Canadiens Get Decisive Win Over Leafs.

Toronto, Jan. 8—With a record attendance jamming Arena Gardens to welcome them on their first appearance here this season in a National Hockey League fixture, Les Canadiens of Montreal, rewarded the huge throng by giving a striking explanation of their outstanding superiority over other teams in the league when they defeated the Toronto Maple Leafs 9 goals to 1 last night.

It was the most decisive victory scored by any team in the National Hockey League for several seasons, and not only did the "Flying Frenchmen" set a record for the N. H. L. this season at least in goals scored during the game, but they also set a record for goals scored in one period, when they flipped the rubber past Roach in the Toronto goal for five counters in the second frame. Led by the dominant figure of Howie Morenz, incomparable centre, the tri-color, from the opening gong, unleashed a dazzling offensive that completely bewildered the Leafs.

Cougars 2, Pirates 0.

Pittsburgh, Jan. 9—The speedy and deceptive Detroit Cougars blanked the Pittsburgh Pirates here last night 2 to 0, in a National League game, in which Hay, Detroit left wing, did all the scoring Hay put across both goals in the first period, the first on a pass from Aurie and the second unassisted, after which the home aggregation held the invaders to even terms or a little better.

The last time the two teams met at Detroit they battled to a 3 to 3 deadlock.

Rangers 5, Black Hawks 0.

New York, Jan. 9—The New York Rangers assumed second place in the American group of the National Hockey League tonight by shutting out the Chicago Black Hawks by five goals to nothing. Billy Boyd and Ching Johnson scored two goals apiece and Bunny Cook one.

Maroons 4, Bruins 1.

Montreal, Jan. 8—The revamped Montreal Maroons made it two straight by taking a 4 to 1 victory over the Boston Bruins at the Forum last night. Of Interest to the Women

MY NEIGHBOR SAYS:

Never put milk and cream near anything with a strong flavor or they will become tainted. Always keep milk bottles covered.

When making plum pudding the cook should allow three hours for boiling it and take great care that the water in the pot never once ceases to boil.

Before placing a sponge cake in the oven to bake try sprinkling a little fine white sugar over the top. This forms the rich brown looking crust that makes bought sponge cakes look so tempting.

To renovate a plush coat hang it over a big kettle of boiling water and let it steam. Keep brushing with a piece of plush or velvet till the nap is raised again. Put each sleeve over the nose of the tea kettle and let the steam penetrate every part thoroughly.

A splendid foot warmer for your bed on cold winter nights may be made by cutting up a number of corks into small pieces and filling a flannel bag with them. Bake it in a not too hot oven for 10 or 15 minutes just before retiring. The finely divided cork will retain its heat for a very long while.

To wash colored ribbons make a lather of cold or lukewarm water and fine soap. Wash the ribbons by "sousing" them up and down and squeezing. Do not rub pull or twist them. Very soiled pieces may be cleansed by rubbing in a good suds with the palms of the hands. Rinse them several times always in soapy water of the same temperature as the wash water.

BROWNIES.

1-4 cup butter
4 squares of chocolate
2 cups of sugar
2 eggs
2 teaspoons vanilla
1 cup of flour
1 cup of coconut or shredded coconut.

Melt butter add melted chocolate stir the sugar break eggs directly into this add the vanilla and stir until smooth. Add flour and nuts or coconut. Pour into a square or oblong cake pan and bake in a slow oven (320 degrees F) about 30 minutes. Remove from the oven and cut in squares.

CHOCOLATE DESSERT

2 cups fine bread crumbs
2 squares melted chocolate
1-3 cup sugar
1-4 teaspoon salt
Pour into a buttered pan and bake very slowly at 300 degrees for about 25 minutes. Serve warm in small dishes topped with whipped cream sweetened and flavored with vanilla or a la mode topped with a small spoonful of ice cream.

One and one half cups whipped cream 1 tablespoon coffee extract or very strong strained coffee 1-3 cup powdered sugar 1 cup raisins lady fingers or strips of sponge cake.

Steam raisins until plump then chill. Whip cream add flavoring and sugar, add raisins and pile in sherbet glasses lined with split lady fingers.

DATE PUDDING

Two cups dates, seeded and chopped fine 1-2 cup nut meats cut fine, 2 eggs beaten light, 3-4 cup honey 1-2 cup flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1-8 cup bran. Mix well, bake 20 minutes in moderate oven. Serve with cream whipped or plain.

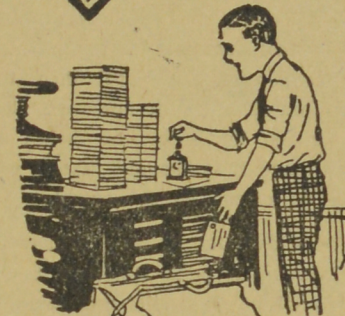

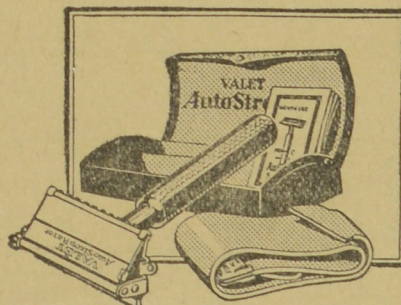
