

REALLY, PHONE GIRLS TALK DIFFERENTLY WHEN OFF DUTY

Things said by the "voice with the smile" when it answers signals while on duty, and things that the same voice says outside of working hours are two very different things, Ohio Bell Telephone company officials say.

While the number of words in a telephone operator's vocabulary cannot be estimated, they are limited to a number of phrases, each to be used at a certain time, Miss Helen Martin, local chief operator, declares.

While off duty on their relief, there is only one phrase that has become standardized, Miss Martin says, and that is "My hours have been changed."

Words used by girls in the toll operating room vary greatly, Miss Grace Fulwiler, toll chief operator says. While there are some standard expressions used in toll operating there is also a great variety because each call demands different questions and reports. The same words cannot be used for any two calls.

Miss Erma Simon, traffic supervisor, says the girls in the rest rooms can be heard at any time to be talking about the dance they went to last night, the party they are going to tomorrow night and the dress they are going to get next week.

Books also form a topic of conversation, and the telephone company has a branch library where books can be taken at any time by the employees.

The average telephone operator's vocabulary is about the same as other girls of the same age and with equal education when the girls are not at work, in the opinion of E. W. Lormor, division traffic supervisor.

He says the average telephone operator has completed two years of high school. The object of set phrases and expressions is not to make operators sound mechanical, Mr. Lormor says, but to make operating methods more effective.

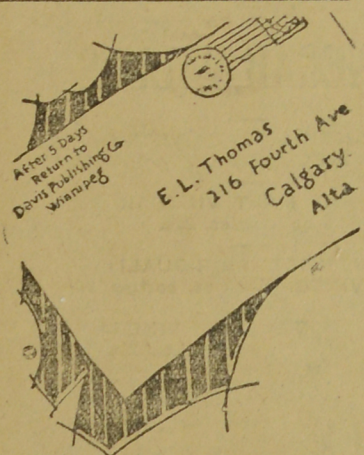

They are the result of careful research by telephone companies over the country, he says. When any one expression is seen to have favorable results, it is adopted until a better one is found. Telephone companies aim to use the "last word" in methods, Mr. Lormor says.

For this reason the company maintains schools for operators before they are employed. Here they learn geography, arithmetic and spelling, and are taught voice technique before going to work in the toll office.

JAMES KAY PASSES AWAY AT CHATHAM

Deceased Was for Many Years Police Magistrate of the City of Moncton.

Moncton, Jan. 31.—The death occurred this morning at his residence in Chatham, N. B., of James Kay, aged 87, one of the oldest barristers of the supreme court, in this province, for many years connected with this city as Police Magistrate and City Court Commissioner.

He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Kay, of McKee's Mills, Kent County, and was twice married. His first wife was Mary Coppin, of Chatham, and his second wife her sister, Sarah, of the same place.

He studied law under W. A. Russell, of Shediac, and later practised in Moncton, where he was in partnership with R. Barry Smith here and the firm of Smith and Kay was for some years well known and prominent in legal affairs. He had been admitted to the Bar, first as an attorney in 1880 and as a barrister in 1882.

About thirty years ago he was appointed Commissioner of the City Court here and upon the death of Jacob Wortman he was also appointed Police Magistrate. He held these positions until 1912, when he retired.

In his earlier years, Mr. Kay had taught school in Shediac and also spent several years as a school teacher in Chatham.

Sincere regret will be felt throughout the community at the passing of a man who endeared himself to all who knew him by his kindly and genial disposition.

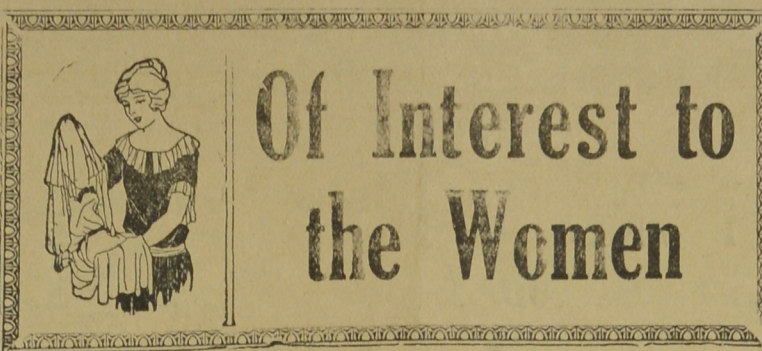

Whole Wheat Fruit Muffins

1 egg
1 cup milk
3-4 teaspoon salt
3 1-2 teaspoons baking powder
2 tablespoons brown sugar
2 cups whole wheat flour
1-2 cup raisins, chopped
2 tablespoons butter melted
Beat egg well and add milk and sugar. Mix flour, baking powder and salt together add raisins and add to egg mixture. Add melted butter and beat thoroughly. Bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees Fahrenheit) twenty-five minutes.

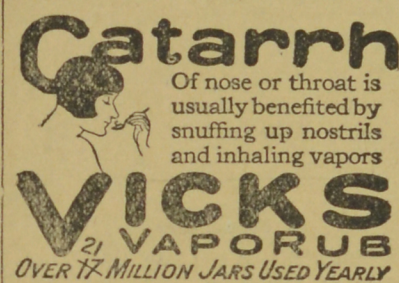

APRICOT SAUCE.

1-4 cup butter
1 cup powdered sugar
2 egg yolks
1-2 cup apricot pulp and juice
Put the butter and sugar together and stir and beat the egg yolks. Add the fruit and stir over hot water until slightly thick. Serve as a sauce with pancakes for a luncheon dessert.

COCOANUT PUDDING.

1-4 cup cornstarch
1-2 cup sugar
2 cups milk
1 cup shredded coconut
Whites of three eggs
1-4 teaspoon salt
1-4 cup maraschino cherries
Whipped cream
Mix cornstarch with sugar and salt add to milk in top of double boiler, stirring constantly until thickened. Cook twenty minutes and fold in coconut and beaten egg whites. Put in molds, chill. Serve with cherries and whipped cream.

PEANUT BUTTER TOAST

6 to 10 slices bread
1 cup peanut butter
3-4 cup milk
2 eggs
1-2 teaspoon salt
Paprika
Fine crumbs
Cut crust from bread and divide in lengthwise strips. Spread peanut butter on both sides of each strip. Add milk and seasoning to the eggs and beat thoroughly. Dip bread into this and into sifted crumbs. Put into a greased pan and bake in a hot oven (450 degrees Fahrenheit) until golden brown.

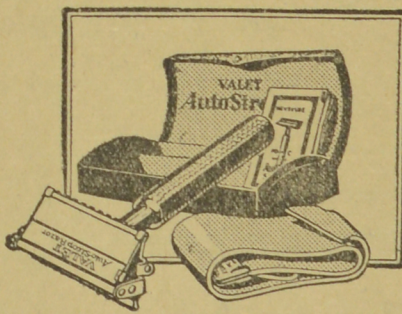
