

KALAMAZOO TO HAVE BIG CROWD ON NEXT WEEK

Kalamazoo Mich., July 14—The Grand Circuit caravan will halt for a one week stand here at Recreation Park, the oldest link in the big time chain, beginning Monday and ending Friday. Harness horse enthusiasts from all over the country and Canada will be on hand to witness a \$70,000 program, headed by the \$25,000 American Pacing Derby and the \$10,000 Exchange Club trot.

The Derby, which will have its fourth renewal, is listed for Tuesday with the Exchange Club on the card for Wednesday.

An international struggle will feature the Derby. Grattan Bars, Jean Grattan and Winnipeg carrying the colors of Canada, will be pitted against an array of American stars including Berry the Great, June Abbe Black Scott, Sir Walter, Lauderdale and Labrador. Grattan Bars is expected to go to the post favorite.

In the Exchange Club, which dates back to 1908, many of the fastest trotters in the lane will compete. They are Cupid's Albingen, Dewey McKinney, Betty Ann Maxey, Clara Bascom, High Noon, Guy Watts, Kashmir, Margaret Axtien, Tippie Frisco, Signal Flash, Signal Spring and John Gallagher.

Horses from no less than 20 states and two Canadian provinces will participate at the meeting. The states are Alabama, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Kansas, Michigan, Missouri, New York, New Jersey, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania Texas and Wisconsin. Ontario and Manitoba, Can. are represented.

Twenty-one races in all are scheduled. Among other features are the 2.06 trot, which will bring out such speedy ones as Clayworth, Doane, Jeritza, Kahla Dillon, Minia Dillon, Nescopec, Trumpet and Wellworthy and the Trotting Horse Club free-for-all in which the three fastest trotters in the country, Hazleton, 2.01½; Sam Williams, 2.02¼ and Guy Ozark 2.02½, will fight it out.

Devon took as usual an early lead and won 5 to 4 last night in a game in which the Imps rallied too late. Devon are now in the lead of the second section of the York County baseball league, having won two games and lost one. "Johns" Keene, hurling for Devon and Dinsmore on the hill for the locals, permitted only four hits each, team errors being the factor in the run scoring.

Last night's game was attended by a fairly large crowd but the fading light allowed only six innings of play. Devon scored in every frame but the first and last, getting two runs in the fourth.

Keene was invincible until the fourth. In that frame Jerry Myshrrall led off with a clean hit. Kierstead got to first on an error by Miles at third. Jerry went to third on Lawrence's error, scoring on McLenahans sacrifice hit.

Big Inning

The fifth was the Imps big inning. Rutter, who led off was given a free trip to the initial sack. He stole around to third. On Cain's double to left field Rutter scored. Dinsmore and Thompson both went out. Cain scored on Myshrrall's single and on "Kato" Keene's error of Kierstead's grounder, Jerry also scored, McLenahan flied out for the third man.

The Imperials almost led the score in their list bat. Rutter reached third on a hit and an error of Lawrence on a throw to second.

Dinsmore flied out for the second man down, Donovan having previously flied to first base. Cain was given a base on balls. With two strikes on "Snap" Thompson, Rutter tried the unexpected, making a daring dash for the plate on Keene's deliberations in the box. It proved unavailing however for Bailey got the ball in plenty of time to catch the runner standing up.

SUGGESTS JOINT CELEBRATION WITH CATHOLICS

Ottawa, Ont., July 13—With the view that the time has come for Canadians of all religious beliefs to stand shoulder to shoulder, for "one grand confederation celebration on the land of religious freedom," Rev. Col. R. H. Steacy, C.M.G., for seven years grand chaplain of the Orange Order in Ontario and prominent in war veterans associations, proposes that Catholics and Protestants should change the respective dates of St. Jean Baptiste day and the celebration of the Battle of the Eoyne and unite in a yearly celebration on July first.

Col. Steacy takes the view that Canada has not any one national day. The French Canadians celebrate St. Jean Baptiste day on June 24. The Orangemen celebrate the anniversary of the Battle of Boyne on July 12. Col. Steacy pointed out that, although in the calendar, the Battle of the Boyne was actually fought on July first and he thought that Orangemen could easily change the date of their annual celebration.

He expressed the opinion that the Catholic Church would be willing to advance the date of their big celebration to unite with Orangemen in proclaiming to the world that Canada was a land of religious freedom.

PLANE RECORDS ARE BROKEN

Philadelphia, July 14—Two world's seaplane records were broken here this morning by the Navy's XPN-12 type A-7383, piloted by Lieut. A. W. Gordon, U. S. N. The first was the world's endurance record for seaplanes carrying 2,000 kilograms "payload" and the second the world's range record under similar conditions. The endurance record was broken at 3:23 a. m. eastern daylight saving time and the range record at 3:43 a. m.
