St. John Fusiliers Take Opener 1-0 from Bathurst

Keating Gets Only Tally in Second Period on Pass From Ferguson—Steller Hockey Exhibition—Game Fast and Clean—North Shore Visitors Show Flashy Forwards.

St. John, Feb. 22—In the fastest and most stubbornly fought hockey game seen in Saint John for many years the Fusiliers added another victory to their string on Tuesday night at the Arena, when they defeated the speedy Bathurst squad 1 to 0 and thereby clinched the first of the home and home playoff series for New Brunswick hockey championship. The score is indicative of the play.

To the soldier defence and their splendid stamina and the brilliant saves by Charlie Wilson in the net must go the credit for the defeat given the team from the North Shore.

Bathurst displayed much the better team work and their ability and consistency in keeping after the puck brought forth round after round of applause from the vast throng which taxed the capacity of the Arena.

James at centre was undoubtedly the fastest man on the ice and his collapse, midway through the final frame, due to strain which was fortunately of a mild character cast a gloom over his teammates and the spectators. He resumed play a few minutes later and was given a tremendous reception.

The North Shore boys presented a formidable appearance and in no way are they to be considered defeated in the playoffs although having lost the first game. Their strength appears to be in the speedy forwards and the vigilant Bond in the net.

Keating Gets Lone Tally.

The lone tally was the result of a combination play by Keating and Ferguson beginning near the Bathurst blue line at the lower end of the rink, in the second period when Keating secured the disc, out-

manoeuvred the flashy James passed to Ferguson at left wing who eluded the poke check of B. Carroll and passed back to Keating who flipped the rubber to the left of the Bathurst net guardian. The goal was the signal for wildest enthusiasm and prolonged cheering.

The contest itself was a stellar exhibition of hockey punctuated with clever stick handling and speedy rushes on the part of both teams.

That the game was one of the cleanest witnessed this season is shown in the fact that during the 60 minutes of furious play only five penalties were handed out. In the majority of cases these were for tripping when poke checking the opponent's rush.

In the first two periods the play was practically all in Dalhousie territory the U. N. B. goalie getting only a few drives in each session. In the closing period Dalhousie made a better showing but was unable to score.

MAINE AND N.B. CIRCUIT BAN ALL OUTSIDE HORSES

Tidbits From Winter Racing Gossip—Sale of Stars.

Boston, Feb. 21—The Maine and New Brunswick Circuit has placed a ban on outside horses only at its Summer meets the restriction being lifted for the fairs.

That the embargo does not apply to Skowhegan and Bangor will be pleasing to a number of men who have found campaigning at these Maine fairs a delightful vacation but who could not have their horses in Maine by March 1.

C. G. "Gil" Brown of Bowdoinham Me., writes:

"Sold the following horses today: Elm B. black gelding 5 years old by Braden Direct, dam is a half sister to Single G.; Ed Allen worked this horse a mile in 2:10 1/4 last year. The new owner is P. A. Cannon, Bowdoinham, Me.

"Sold also Abe Moffit a 4 year old bay gelding which took a win race record in 1927 as a 3 year old of 2:12 1/4. The owner is Edwin Mathewson, Bridgeport Conn. This colt has as much speed as horses have.

"About three weeks ago I sold a bay mare called Kitty Gatewood free-legged pacer 5 years old by Gatewood to Carl Hatch mail carrier at Bowdoinham. They had a little race here on the 11th over the ice. I helped them measure a quarter mile before the race myself. This mare was a very easy winner pacing the first quarter in 29 3/4 seconds the next in 30 1/4 the third one in 31 and she was looking for horses. The most remarkable thing I ever saw done as from the time I bought her from the Chicago sale until I sold her she was only harnessed once and she looks as though she could pace a quarter in 29 seconds now. Doesn't wear anything."

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
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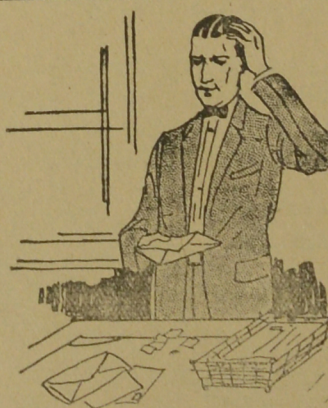
