

TRACK LAYING IS RUSHED ON C.N.R. BRANCHES IN WEST

Montreal, Que., Nov. 15.—A total of 390.6 miles of track was laid during the present season on Canadian National Railways branch lines in Western Canada and track laying work is being rushed on all lines between now and freeze up, it was stated by C. A. Dixon, Chief Engineer Western Region Canadian National Railways, who is in Montreal on a business trip. On this mileage 168.1 miles was in Manitoba and included work of the Flin Flon Branch and the Hudson Bay Extension to Port Churchill; in Saskatchewan a total of 158.2 miles of steel was laid on nine branch lines; in Alberta with three branch lines under construction this year 64.3 miles of line were laid.

The line toward Port Churchill will be within fifty miles of that terminus before freeze-up and work on laying ties and steel will continue through the winter months on this line. Ties and rails will be laid first and ballasting will be done by means of trains full across Muskeg sections where the work would otherwise be very difficult of accomplishment. The Flin Flon line has been completed, there being 87.1 miles of this which have been graded, ballasted and laid with steel during the present season. During the period when the harvest rush was on in Western Canada men were released from steel laying and ballasting gangs to work in the harvest fields but with the completion of that work ballasting and steel laying gangs were increased to full force, and the laying of steel on all branch lines in the three Prairie Provinces will be practically completed by the time winter arrives.

Grading work completed in the three Provinces during this season totalled 384.4 miles. Of this 87.1 miles were on the Flin Flon Line and 94.5 miles on the Port Churchill. Of the latter mileage 59.0 miles were ballasted and 61.0 miles of steel laid. In Saskatchewan 176.5 miles were graded, 84.4 miles bal-

lasted and 158.2 miles of steel laid. This work was on the following branch lines: Weyburn-Radville; Willowbrook, Northwest; Iturgis-Poosane; Poosane-Northerly; Shellbrook-Westerly; Turtleford-Southeast; Kindersley-Gridden; Spruce Lake-Westerly; and Hudson Bay Junction-Southerly. In Alberta three branch lines were under construction these being the Elkpoint-Southerly, Ashmount-Bennyville and Breton Clover Bar Branch. On the three a total of 26.3 miles was graded, 52.4 miles ballasted and steel laid on 54.3 miles.

THE SQUIRES GOVERNMENT TAKES OFFICE

St. John's Nfld., Nov. 18.—The administration of Sir Richard Squires took over the government of Newfoundland at 5 o'clock Saturday afternoon, when the new cabinet was sworn in shortly after the resignation of the defeated Alderdice government was tendered Governor Sir John Middleton.

The new executive is as follows: Prime Minister and Minister of Justice, Sir Richard A. Squires; Finance and Customs, Peter J. Cashin, Ferryland; Posts and Telegraphs, W. W. Halfyard, Trinity North; Colonial Secretary, Dr. Arthur Barnes; without portfolio, Sir William Coaker, T. Cook, Dr. A. Campbell, P. J. Lewis, Dr. Harris M. Mosdell, P. Gordon Bradley.

Department officers not in the executive council are: Minister of Fisheries, Clyde Lake, Burin West; Minister of Public Works, Richard Hibbs, Fogo; Minister of Agriculture and Mines, Joseph Downey, St. George's. In the executive formed by Sir Richard Squires are four of the ministers who sat in the previous administration from 1919 to 1923.

PRIZE LEMON PIE

1 cupful hard wheat flour
1-3 cup shortening
1-6 cup cold water
1-3 teaspoon salt
Filling—
1 cupful boiling water
1 tablespoon butter
1 lemon
4 eggs
3-4 cupful sugar
3 teaspoons cornstarch
Meringue—
4 egg whites
3 teaspoons sugar
1 teaspoon lemon juice
Filling: Put in double boiling water and butter. Wash lemon, grate the rind, adding this to the water and butter. Squeeze four tablespoonfuls lemon juice into a cup. Separate the eggs, beating whites and yolks separately. Add to yolks sugar which has been thoroughly mixed with cornstarch. Add lemon juice and beat well. Add this mixture to boiling water, butter and lemon rind. Beat whites of eggs until stiff and separate in two parts, adding one portion to thickened mixture and fold in carefully. Put this into baked crust.

Meringue: To remaining egg whites add sugar and lemon juice. Beat well, pile on pie and brown.

PARKER HOUSE ROLLS

1 cup scalded milk
2 tablespoons shortening
1 1-2 teaspoon salt
1-2 cup lukewarm water
1-2 yeast cake
1 tablespoon sugar
3 1-4 to 3 1-2 cups flour
Add the salt and shortening to the scalded milk; set aside until lukewarm. Dissolve the yeast with the sugar in the lukewarm water and add to the milk. Sift in enough flour to make the dough stiff enough to handle. Place dough on floured board and knead until smooth and elastic. Return to the bowl which has been brushed with melted shortening; cover closely to exclude the air; let rise to double its bulk. Then place on board with as little flour as possible. Roll out one half inch thick; cut with round cutter, put a small piece of butter in the centre, brush the edges with milk; fold over, pressing the edges firmly together; cover and let rise until double its size; brush the tops with milk and melted butter. Bake in hot oven 20 minutes.

SALMON SALAD

1 can of the best salmon
1 cupful shaved hearts of celery
2 hearts of lettuce
French dressing
Open the can of salmon and stand it in a kettle with a little hot water cover the kettle and boil a half hour. Take out the can, drain off the fat, and turn out the salmon carefully. Dust it with salt and pepper, pour over a half cupful of vinegar, lay on top a mashed clove of garlic and a slice of onion; cover and stand in a cold place over night or for several hours. At serving time break the salmon into large pieces, arrange them in nests of lettuce leaves, garnish with the celery and pour over a well made French dressing. Garnish the top with strips of pimento.

hoops.

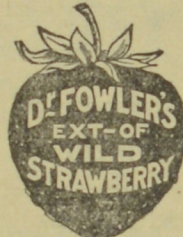

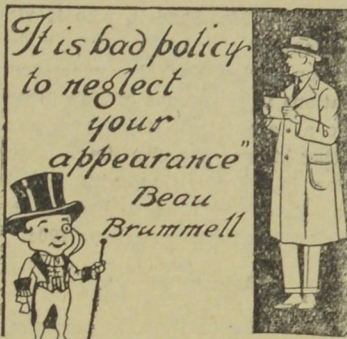
