Nugent was in the chair in the absence of the president, Rev. Dr. F. A. Wightman. Various matters of importance were taken up, among them being extension work. Mrs. Menzies reported on the visit she and Mrs. Leslie Wood made to the Fredericton Board of School Trustees at the last meeting, representing the organization and extension committee. At the meeting Mrs. Menzies explained the working of clubs where formed in each school, and where the parents and teachers' interests are most vitally centered, showing clearly the non-interference of the work with the school authorities. She told of the value of the clubs by recommendation and results obtained as quoted by the Chief Superintendent of Education and other educational officials in various provinces. Dr. C. G. VanWart, the chairman of the Board, thanked Mrs. Menzies for her first hand information and assured the committee that the request for endorsement by them would be further considered. 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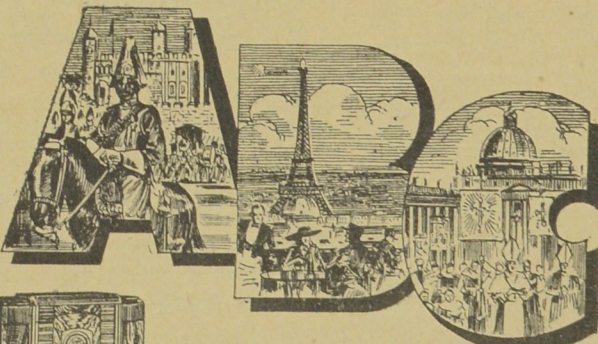
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
