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## Boston Bruins Win Pre-Season Opener From Canadiens 2-0

Clapper and Weiland Score Goals in Third Period After Their Team Was Outplayed For Two Periods.

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Oct. 29—Staging a strong offensive drive in the third and last period of their game, with Montreal Canadiens at The Forum last night Boston Bruins hammered in a 2-0 victory as the National Hockey League clubs opened their pre-season Maritime tour.

Goals from the sticks of "Dit" Clapper and "Cooney" Weiland of the Bruins' first line sent the Canadiens, who had outplayed and outskated the Boston club in the first two sessions, down to defeat.

The game was a decided improvement over Friday night's season opener between Bruins and Cubs and fully 4,000 watched the N. H. L. clubs tangle in their first pre-season fixture.

Wilt Cude, clever net custodian for Habitués, was knocked out just before the second period closed when struck by a flying puck before colliding with Eddie Shore but was able to resume playing after restoratives were applied.

Canadiens started their fast line of George Mantha, Leroy Goldsworthy and Armand Mondou against the Clapper-Weiland-Beattie front line of the Bruins as the game, got under way.

The Habitués warmed to their work and for several minutes gave the Bruins many anxious moments. Time after time it fell to the lot of burly defenceman Eddie Shore to relieve the pressure and this he did by taking the disc right into his opponents' zone.

Maxie Bennett, formerly of the Hamilton Tigers, playing for Canadiens, made a couple of nice rushes up the ice but was forced out of play as he hit the Bruin defence.

Shore missed a beautiful chance when he was right in on Cude, just about the halfway mark in the period, and as Cude rushed out he shot wild to the right boards.

Canadiens opened fast again with Joliat rushing up on the plays, and Larochelle and Lepine making several rushes. Larochelle banged a shot off Thompson's stick. Shannon drove one at Cude that was whisked away and Thompson just knocked George Mantha's drive down in time. Taking a perfect pass from Haynes, McGill missed from close-in. Thompson making a lovely save. Canadiens were forcing the play at the bell.

## NICKLIN PRAISES BRAND OF GAME IN ENGLAND

Many Canadians Playing Hockey in Old Country

LONDON, Oct. 29 — The greatest hockey season in England's history is getting underway with more Canadian players than ever before on hand and plans being advanced for new and bigger rinks throughout the country. England has seen enough good hockey to know it wants only the best—and that's what it will get this season.

**Great Crowds**  
An early season match between Streatham and "The Rest" attracted a capacity crowd of 3,000 at the Streatham rink and at Wembley more than 10,000 watched the Lions and Canadians in their first engagement.

Percy Nicklin, who piloted Moncton Hawks to Canadian senior championships in 1933 and 1934 and now is managing the Richmond Hawks in the English League, said he was so impressed with what he had already seen that he doubted whether Halifax Wolverines, Canada's 1936 Olympic team, could defeat all the best teams in England.

**Play Improved**  
Standard of play has improved year by year, as more Canadians came here to play under the British ice hockey association, but the 1935-36 season will give British fans the best ice entertainment they have ever had.

A rink is being built at Earls Court along the lines of the Detroit Olympia, home of the Red Wings of the National Hockey League. It will accommodate more than 8,000 spectators. Kensington Corinthians and Earls Court Rangers will play their home games there.

**New Structures**

At Brighton, a "Sports Dome" is being built to seat 4,000 and to house the Brighton Tigers. Plans are well advanced for rinks in other parts of the country. London Speedway managers are particularly interested in the sport which is filling what rinks that exist to capacity.

One of them, Fred Monckford, intends to build a new one in southeast London to seat 12,000. He is to visit Canada and the United States to study plans of the big National League arenas in Toronto, New York, Detroit and Chicago.

"Burdo" Burden, the fiery coach of the U.N.B. squad, is on the rampage and when he gets through with that team of his we won't know it—the boys will all have to be introduced to one another again. He sure is cut up about the showing his team made against the Mounties on Thanksgiving Day, and we don't blame him for adopting the house cleaning plan. He cannot possibly do the team any harm by shaking up a few of the players, and it is quite probable that it will do them a lot of good—at least some of them will be spared the pain of going through life suffering under the delusion that they are rugby players.

When "Burdo" gets through it is quite likely that many of the boys who thought their positions were secure will find themselves struggling to hold a place on the second team. The Red and Black clad rugbys have only three days in which to bring about a miraculous change in their style of rugby. Then they stack up against that little band of fighters, Mt. A., who outplayed them in a scoreless tie here on Thanksgiving Day.

"Bull" Lister, the Mt. A. coach, claims that his team did not over-exert itself to outplay U.N.B. and that they will turn on the steam in Sackville.
