Financial Statement

The financial statement of the County, audited by H. G. Haben, chartered accountant, revealed that the county's total disbursements from Nov. 30, 1934 were \$42,790.19 and the total receipts, including \$715.45 which was on hand in the bank, amounted to \$60,850.36. This leaves the County with a total surplus of \$18,060.17. Other items in the receipts included a \$15,000 negotiated bank loan and ordinary receipts totalling \$45,134.91.

A. C. FRASER
RETIRES FROM
C.N.R. SERVICE

Montreal, July 2. — A. C. Fraser, Maritime Superintendent, Canadian Pacific Department of Communications, who retired from service July 1st after 45 years service, and Donald Coons, Superintendent at Moose Jaw, Sask. who will retire December 31st after 45 years service, were the guests of honour at golf and dinner at the Whitlock Golf Club on Saturday, when W. D. Neil, General Manager, Department of Communications and his fellow officers, together with Hon. H. J. Humphrey, vice-president and general manager Eastern Lines, and H. C. Grout, assistant to the vice-president, united in a pleasing testimonial to the two retiring officers, who have not only given many years of loyal and effective service to the Company, but have proven themselves worthy citizens in many phases of the Life of the community. After a happy afternoon on the links and dinner, E. H. Goodfellow, assistant manager of Communications Eastern Lines, on behalf of the gathering presented Mr. Fraser with a silver flask and a cane and W. M. Thompson, assistant manager of Communications, Western Lines, presented Mr. Coons with a silver cigarette box and a cane. In making the presentations both Mr. Goodfellow and Mr. Thompson reviewed the careers of the guests of honour, and spoke in intimate and glowing terms of their respective achievements in the field of Communication in this country.

Mr. Fraser joined the department in 1890, as an operator in Montreal, and in the course of his long career served in positions of increasing responsibility in practically all the major centres in Canada, being finally appointed Maritime Superintendent at Saint John in June 1916. Mr. Coons' career was in many respects similar to that achieved by Mr. Fraser. ENGLISH HAVE
NEW REMEDY FOR
FOOT-FAULTERS

NEW YORK, July 2.—Despite the debate about the service rule in tennis popularly known as the foot fault, no change has been made. At the recent meeting of the International Federation the nations came to a deadlock. Jean Borotra, T. B. Barker of South Africa, Dr. H. O. Behrens of Germany and everybody else in attendance attempted to untangle the knotty problem that has caused more intense discussion than amateur standings.

Many referees in this country, believing that a change had been made, have inquired of the writer: "What did the Federation do about the foot-fault rule?" Now it comes out that H. A. Sabelli, the secretary of the English Lawn Tennis Association, was named to head a committee to solve the problem and report.

Europeans regard Americans as the champion foot-faulters of the world. Francis X. Shields was penalized no fewer than 23 times in one match at Wimbledon last season. Back in the era of the California Comet, McLoughlin, the English were positive he foot-faulted in delivering his cyclonic service. A movie camera was trained upon him without his knowledge. The film dismayed the English, as it showed the service legal. It was the first use of the movie camera in sport.

American Master Servers

The American development of service as a weapon has always troubled the French, English, German and others. Tinkering with the rule has become a passion. Through it all the Americans continue to be the master servers of the world, with others striving to copy them.

Sabelli and his committee have at last proposed a solution. It comes, fresh from the griddle so to speak, to the writer from London. It is partly the idea of H. H. Monckton, also one last proposed a solution.

Under the proposed rule, the area of the service court is slightly reduced. This, it is believed, will steady the server, compelling accuracy, and so insure his proper stance and attention to the position of his feet. A three-foot alley, instead of the centre line, separates the service courts on each side of the net. Altogether the court offers a diminished space for the server to shoot at."

Halifax Shipyards

HALIFAX, July 2.—Contract for repairing the freighter Kafirstan, damaged two weeks ago in collision with the liner Empress of Britain, has been awarded the Halifax Shipyards, it was learned here today. With temporary repairs almost completed in Sydney, the Kafirstan is expected to arrive here under her own power in a few days.

HOLIDAY FIRES
