Angus Campbell, well known and popular citizen, who retired recently from the firm of J. C. Bisteen & Co. where he had been an expert cabinet maker for a period of 45 years, left over the weekend for the Kamloops, B. C., where he will, in future, reside with his son, Clayton Campbell.

Before leaving for the west Mr. Campbell was the recipient of a beautiful leather travelling bag, the gift of Ald. David McCaughey and Mr. Campbell's fellow employees at the west end woodworking factory. Ald. McCaughey and twelve employees called on the veteran cabinet maker at his home on Woodstock road over the weekend and beside presenting him with the bag, also read a farewell address to him. It was a notable occasion for him, Mr. Campbell said as he replied feelingly to the tributes paid him.

The veteran woodworker who is more than eighty years of age has been a prominent member of St. Andrew's Presbyterian church and also St. Andrew's Society. He has earned the popularity of a large number in this city and his departure for the west will be learned with sincere regret, although the best wishes of his friends will follow him in his new home. Besides Clayton, another brother, Archie, also resides in British Columbia.

MATRICULATIONS START

A large number of students are in the city today and commenced writing the Matriculation and High School Leaving examinations which began in the Provincial Normal School building this morning. The Daily Mail had a visit today from an old time printer who learned the printing trade with the Fredericton Reporter when that newspaper was located in the same building now occupied by the Daily Mail.

The old time printer is I. J. Stewart, of Lowell, Mass. He started to learn his trade in this office sixty years ago and continued to work here until 1883 when he moved to Boston. At that time the late G. Fred Fisher, mayor of Fredericton, editor of the Reporter and the late Charles A. Sampson was city editor. Mr. Sampson also conducted a candy store in the front of the building downstairs and Miss Kate Hogg occupied the rooms upstairs now used for the editorial and business office of the Daily Mail.

In going through the Mail office today, looking over the old place where he worked, Mr. Stewart stated that he had worked with an old time printer named George Haviland and wondered "if George was still around." He was agreeably surprised when he found that Mr. Haviland was still going strong as a member of the Mail staff. Mr. Stewart also stated that he was a member of the old 71st Band and played side by side with George Haviland and Bill Buzzell. He was well acquainted with Charlie Biggs and Hugh O'Neil. Mr. Stewart, who has retired from the printing business, is spending a week in Fredericton and is receiving a hearty welcome from old friends.

COUNTY COUNCIL  
CONVENES TODAY

Fourteen Parishes and  
Two Towns Send  
Representatives

Accounts Audited

Revaluation will Probab-  
ly Be Discussed This  
Afternoon

Representatives from the fourteen parishes and two towns of the municipality of York are here today to attend the July session of the York County Council which convened at 3 p. m., A.S.T. in the Council Chambers of the County Court House, Warden W. J. Gaynor, McAdam, was in the chair and, following the prayer by the Chaplain, Ven. Archdeacon A. F. Bate, the business of the council was begun. It is not likely that the council will prorogue before Saturday.

All the county accounts have been in the hands of Major John S. Scott, County Secretary-Treasurer, for a few days and the financial report prepared by H. G. Haben, accountant, will, no doubt, be submitted to the council this afternoon after approval by the Finance Committee.

Valuation

Valuation of the fourteen parishes and two towns will, no doubt, be discussed at this afternoon's session and steps will be taken to have a revaluation placed on them. It is the practice of the Board of Valuers to revalue the parishes and towns every

Three Months' Period  
Shows Decrease More  
Than \$10,000

June Report

Decrease Also Shown In  
Collections For June  
of \$2,314.58

The collections for the three months' period ending June 30, 1935, amounts to \$97,932.44, according to the statement of national revenue collections issued this morning for the port of Fredericton by F. P. Colter, collector here. The amount collected in the same period in 1934, was \$108,231.37, a decrease of \$10,298.93.

The report also shows that the amount of revenue collected in June, 1934, was \$34,842.71. This amount is a decrease for the present month of \$2,314.58.
