New Milk Prices  
Are Effective In  
Province Today

Beginning today a new schedule of prices for milk and cream in several areas of the province will be put into effect as established by the New Brunswick Dairy Products Commission. The prices have been previously announced.

A big advantage of the standardized price which has been established by the Commission is that besides being a help to the consumer, it is beneficial to the farmer. The farmer will no longer be subject to price fluctuation. Payment for his product is assured. Severe penalties have been drafted for those sellers who will not comply with the conditions set forth by the commission. It is stated that cream will sell at the same price in Saint John, Moncton and Fredericton. Milk will retail for ten cents in this city and Saint John. Whipping cream of 30 to 33 per cent butterfat content the price will be 50 cents retail; 8 cents per pint and 15 cents per half pint.

## FEDERAL VOTERS' LISTS

Complete compilation of voters' lists for York-Sunbury for the approaching federal election shows that this year there will be a total of 1,206 more voting in both counties this year than would have been eligible by the 1934 lists. Major J. S. Scott, county secretary-treasurer, announced the list this morning and reports that the completed lists have been sent to Ottawa. York County this year will have a total of 20,437 eligible to vote. Of this total 6,166 have the franchise in this city. Sunbury county will have 4,368 eligible to vote in the federal election.

ACTED UPON BY  
BOARD OF HEALTH

The Board of Health following the course advocated by The Daily Mail, on numerous occasions, has taken steps to see that conditions complained of in connection with the pigsty situated on the Woodstock road, will be brought up to standard, it was learned this morning from Dr. J. M. Cameron. Dr. Cameron in company with A. C. Fleming, sanitary inspector, visited the scene last week and as a result of their investigation the machinery will be set in motion to have this public nuisance and health menace taken care of. Residents of the locality in question as well as motorists have complained that a very annoying odor has prevailed in that section of Woodstock road where the pigsty is located. As pointed out several times, the condition is deplorable and the action of the Board of Health to correct this condition is another reform brought about by revelations of The Daily Mail.

NEW YORK, July 15—Supreme Court Justice Salvatore A. Cotillo considered the report of Special Referee O. L. Fay recommending an annulment of the stormy marriage of Clendenin J. Ryan, heir to the traction fortune of Thomas Fortune Ryan, and his wife, the former Countess Marie-Anne Von Wurmb-Stuppach. Fay, in his report, characterized the Countess as a fortune-hunting fraud, and after reviewing her relations with Count Vladimir Mitrovsky, her former fiancé, said that "her marriage was only a step in the conspiracy to secure funds to return to Count Mitrovsky."
