

LIBERAL PARTY NOMINATIONS ON JULY 27

Executive Meeting On Saturday, Nomination Convention Discussed

Prospective Candidates

Number of Names Mentioned As Possible Candidates

The Liberal party in York county, which certainly has lots of pep, and has been keeping its organization up since the election of June 27, held an executive meeting on Saturday afternoon and discussed matters in regard to the coming federal election. The executive included the members of the York-Sunbury Liberal Association and after deliberating matters for some time they decided that the Liberal party's nominating convention for the federal constituency of York-Sunbury will be held in Fredericton on Saturday, July 27. The details of the convention were left with the officers to work out. A committee was appointed to interview prospective candidates and the names of one or more of these will go before the convention which meets on July 27.

A number of more or less prominent men have been mentioned in connection with the nomination. These include ex-Mayor A. W. Coombes of North Devon, and for years a prominent Liberal; and also Mayor W. G. Clark, P. J. Hughes, K.C., Dr. W. C. Crockett, Major J. S. Scott, J. Bacon Dickson, and also E. W. Stairs, of Southampton who was recently elected to the local legislature. D. W. Mersereau of Fredericton Junction a former minister of agriculture in the Foster government, is also spoken of by his friends in Sunbury county, but the mention of Mr. Mersereau's name as a candidate is not taken seriously by those who have the interests of the Liberal party at heart. It is understood that Mr. Mersereau may be settled by giving him a job as road supervisor or some other office for which he is probably qualified. The name of Brig. General F. W. Hill is also mentioned but as the general is a comparative stranger in these parts (Continued on Page Five)

FATALITY DUE TO ELECTRIC STORM FRIDAY

Frank Shortill Met Tragic Death on Sunday

Inquest Tomorrow

Devon Ice Dealer Died Instantly From Shock In Cellar of Home

An inquest into the tragic death of Frank Shortill, 58-year-old ice merchant who died instantly in the cellar of his North Devon home Sunday afternoon when he attempted to turn an electric switch, will be held tomorrow evening at McAdam's Undertaking Parlors. It was announced here today by Dr. J. M. Cameron, acting coroner. A jury has already been selected.

It is understood that an autopsy will be performed on Mr. Shortill's body but this has not yet been definitely decided upon today.

Frank Shortill well known ice merchant of this vicinity died instantly in the cellar of his home at North Devon, a few minutes after two o'clock on Sunday afternoon, following an attempt to turn an electric switch which would put a small water pump in motion.

Mr. Shortill's body was discovered by Aileen Burns, a niece, who had been keeping house for the Shortill's for the past some time. Miss Burns called in neighbors — George Jamer and Miss Kay Jamer — and when they reached the cellar they found Mr. Shortill slumped over the pump apparently lifeless. He had been dead for probably an hour, it was later stated by the acting coroner, Dr. J. M. Cameron.

It appears that Mr. Shortill had reached for the switch and instead had touched a live wire above it. This together with the fact that his feet were on the damp ground of the cellar caused instant death. When the ice merchant's body was discovered rigor mortis had set in.

Mrs. Shortill said that she and her husband had returned from church and the last she saw of her husband he was in the yard. He had evidently gone from there to the cellar and she had missed him only about an hour.

Dr. Wright was called and permission to remove the body was given by Dr. J. M. Cameron, who acted as coroner in the absence from the city of Dr. Charles MacKay.

The late Mr. Shortill was born at Royal Road, York county, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Owen Shortill. He had resided in North Devon for the past twenty-five years, during which time he had been in the ice business and was well known and popular for his honesty and fair dealings with other men. He was a member of St. Anthony's church in South Devon and is survived by his wife.

The funeral will take place Wednesday morning, leaving the home at 9:45 (Daylight Saving Time) for High Mass of Requiem at ten o'clock (Daylight Saving Time) at St. Anthony's church. Interment will be made in the Sunnybank cemetery.

TREASURE HUNT ENDED

R.C.M.P. who investigated what was purported to be a treasure hunt during recent weeks, reported today that the flight of two elderly gold seekers nearly turned into a tragedy. Organized searches finally found 68-year-old Charles Dwyer of North Lake, and Newton Foster, 78, of North Lake, both considerably weakened from shortage of food and exposure. Neither had had food or shelter for several days. It is reported that the two were on the lookout "for hidden treasure." When found by the searching party which followed them for several days, picked up clue traces here and there, the two men were sitting in a clump of bushes near the edge of a swamp. A feeble cough emanating from one of the men permitted their discovery.

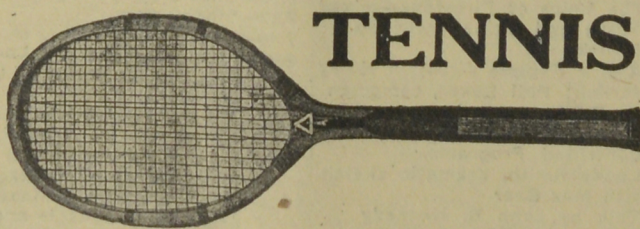
