IN COUNTY  
LAST EVENING****Two Ministers and Candidate Heard at Enthusiastic Meeting**

MINTO, Sunbury County, October 3.—“We promised you economy and we are practicing economy,” said Hon. C. T. Richard, Provincial Secretary-Treasurer, in speaking of the Dysart Government last night at a meeting held in the interest of the Liberal party at the Strand Theatre in Minto. A large gathering was in attendance. Other speakers were Hon. J. B. McNair, K. C., Attorney-General, His Worship Mayor W. G. Clark and Bert Sutherland. Major Walter C. Lawson, M. P., acted as chairman.

“I speak of the Dysart Government, because of the camouflage that is going about today,” said Mr. Richard. He said that the Dysart Government has been in power only a little over eight weeks and it is not an easy matter to jump into the harness. He said, “I found hundreds of names on the payrolls, names of men who never worked on the roads. We find hundreds of names on the former payrolls for extremely small localities. This was a way of buying votes.”

Mr. Richard charged that the former administration, in the last five weeks of their term, had spent a million and one half dollars on our permanent roads. He said that the men loafed on the jobs. Everything was carried on slipshod. Money was squandered.

“We haven't investigated everything yet,” said Mr. Richard. He said, “Our opponents say that we have been eight weeks in power and we have not given old age pensions yet. And yet the members of that former government took years and we never got old age pensions. We have appointed our director and we have started under way.”

“We promised your economy,” said Mr. Richard. He said, “We found we could save three to four thousand dollars per mile on road contracts. We called the contractors together. They kicked. On one contract we saved \$35,000. Altogether, we saved this province \$250,000.”

“Our opponents talk about free school books,” said Mr. Richard, “but they know that a special act has to be passed. He said, “That act cannot be passed by the cabinet. Our opponents abolished the act two years ago. You will get the free school books as soon as we can give them to you.”

Mr. McNair, in speaking, said, “Our opponents are seeking to bring in provincial matters into this campaign. They are trying to fight over the old ground again. They say that the new Dysart government has bought more road machinery in the last two weeks than the Conservative government bought in the last two years of their administration. This is false. Not a single cent has been paid for road machinery since we came into power. I have the Deputy Minister's assurance that this is correct. Six weeks before the election, the former administration bought \$203,000 worth of road machinery.” He said, “Our opponents are now complaining about the condition of the roads. And they spent a million more than the allotment for roads in the last year of their administration.”

In speaking on Federal policies, Mr. McNair said that in New Brunswick, we derive our livelihood from mining, fishing, agriculture and lumbering. And Mr. Bennett says that there are industries in Ontario and Quebec that must be protected. A hundred pound bag of sugar in Cuba costs \$1.50. It costs 30 cents to bring it to the Canadian port. When we get it, it costs \$5.60. The Bennett Government says there are some sugar refineries in Canada, and we lost our potato market.

“Why should not the people be living comfortably?” asked Mr. Clark. He said that this is a matter of trade and commerce. We must lower our tariff affects our railroads, our industries and our home produce. But we cannot get trade under high protection policies. This is evident today. Speaking further on the Bennett administration, Mr. Clark said that we do not want dictatorship in Canada, and the Bennett administration is tending in that direction.

Other Liberal meetings which were held last night were at Nasonworth, where the speakers were H. Ralph Gunter, M. P., Brigadier-General F. W. Hill, A. W. Coombes and A. Limerick and at Kingsclear, where the speakers were E. W. Statirs, M. P., H. C. Greenlaw, Byron Fisher and C. R. Barry.

A large and enthusiastic meeting was held at Penniac in the interests of Mr. Hanson, at which Mr. W. J. West and Mr. E. C. Atkinson were the speakers.

Mr. W. J. West discussed the principles of Liberalism and explained what Liberalism stood for. He also discussed the Conservative principles and what they stood for, and clearly demonstrated to the audience that Canada needed at the present time a Conservative Party under the astute
