

# BOSTON BRUINS ARRIVE IN N. B. ON TWENTY-FIRST

Halifax Report Said  
They Would Train  
There

## Unconfirmed

D. W. Griffiths Inform-  
ed of Intention to  
Train in N. B.

Contrary to a recent report in a Halifax paper that the Boston Bruins and Montreal Canadiens would train in Halifax this fall, D. W. Griffiths, director of the New Brunswick Bureau of Information and Tourist Travel, received a wire today from Arthur H. Ross, manager of the Boston team, stating definitely that the Bruins and Bruins' Cubs will train in Saint John and will arrive in this province on October 21st.

The contents of the telegram received by Mr. Griffiths are as follows: "We are training in Saint John. Arriving twenty-first and expect to play games with Canadiens at Saint John, Moncton, Halifax and Charlottetown. Best regards, Arthur H. Ross." Mr. Griffiths, on reading the article in the Halifax paper had thought it peculiar in view of the fact that the Bruins and Cubs were booked to train in this province, and wired Mr. Ross asking him if it were correct that they were to train in Halifax.

C. F. Adams, general manager of the Bruins and Cubs, vice president of the Boston Braves, and majority shareholder in all three clubs, owns a sporting camp on the southwest Miramichi, and passed through this city last Saturday on his way to Boston after spending some time at his camp. He expects to return to his camp on the twentieth of this month and will in all probability accompany his teams to the province.

It is expected that Fred Lionel Hitchman, of the original Bruin defence combination of Shore and Hitchman, who is now managing the Cubs will be with the hockeyists when they arrive here to train. Mr. Hitchman, as well as Mr. Ross and Mr. Adams, is a personal friend of the tourist director, and is well known in this province, having on several occasions visited here on fishing and hunting expeditions. It is expected that between thirty and forty players will be in the Bruins' training camp this year.

# NEW DWELLINGS BEING BUILT FOR FIRE REFUGEES

Expected to Complete  
Buildings in Week or  
Ten Days

## Health Survey

Household Utensils Sup-  
plied by Red Cross  
and Government

Word comes from T. A. MacDonald, Farm Settlement Board, that great progress is being made in the erection of new dwellings for the people who suffered greatly during the forest fires in Charnessy, Tracadie and Belledune last August. These people lost practically all of the household furniture, the hay and grain that the farmers had just cut was a total loss and some of the potatoes that were still in the ground were half baked due to the intense heat from the fire passing over the area. The general health of the people in these areas have been good and Dr. W. F. Roberts, Minister of Health for this province made a personal survey along with the medical officer of that district.

At Charnessy, all of the houses will be completed within ten days and the people are looking forward with pride on moving into these new dwellings which are being sponsored by the local Government. The majority at the present time are all under the new cover.

At Belledune one or two families have already moved into their new quarters and the rest will be completed within two weeks. And at Tracadie the same condition is taking place with the people being very happy over the thought of moving into new homes.

The houses at Charnessy are made of square log blocks. The houses are 16 x 20 with a 10 foot post and are 1 1/2 story high. The floor is a double one, tongue in groove the gable-end is shingled and also the roof, which is square pitched. The new houses at Tracadie and Belledune are a little larger for the most part, ranging from 16 x 20 feet up to 23 x 30 feet. These houses have two stories and the same method of flooring is used also the sides and the roof of the houses are shingled. Some of the lumber used in these places are owned and furnished by the people of the place. The Tracadie area will be a little long in their erection as they are building a larger house but hope is contained by the Department of Lands and Mines that it will be very short before they too will move into their new dwellings.

The Provincial Government are supplying these stricken people with stoves and tin ware and the Red Cross have also helped with the sending of dishes and clothing. It is hoped by the Department that they will have sufficient funds to enable them to carry on the buying of beds and mattresses for these people. About 75 or 80 beds and mattresses are needed and the Department would appreciate it very much if the people of the province would co-operate in making this undertaking possible.

### THANKS FOR CO-OPERATION

The Canadian Red Cross has expressed deep appreciation of the co-operation of the various persons and organizations in this community and others who so generously helped them in serving the fire refugees of Gloucester county during the relief work there following the recent forest fires. Special thanks were given to Ven. Archdeacon A. F. Bate, rector of Fredericton, who gave the use of the Parish Hall for the receiving and packing of goods and to the Women's Institute of Stanley who sent many valuable articles for distribution amongst the refugees.

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## Lawyers Here Tak- ing Estate for Costs

J. F. Teed, W. A. I. Anglin and L. McRitchie, Saint John Barristers, and J. E. Friel, H. D. Riley, and T. T. Goodwin, Moncton barristers are in Fredericton today in connection with taxing their costs in the administration of the estate of the late Walter H. Wilson, who died some time ago in Moncton. The late Mr. Wilson left an estate over which there has been considerable dispute. The dispute concerning the disposal of one half of the proceeds of the will was before a court presided over by Chief Justice J. B. M. Baxter some time ago. According to the will one half of the proceeds were to provide for the education of children of relatives of the deceased, but it was never made clear what was to be done with the other half. The lawyers mentioned above were retained as representatives of claimants to the estate and are in Fredericton today for the purpose of taxing their costs to the estate.

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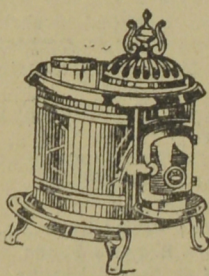
