BETTER TRAFFIC FOR QUEEN STREET THIS SUMMER

D. W. Olts, Police Commission Chairman and Others Discuss It

By-Law Change

Better Routing of Traffic, More Adequate Parking Needed

Speaking to the Daily Mail this morning in regard to our front page editorial of last evening about the regulation of traffic on Queen Street, D. W. Olts, chairman of the Police Commission, stated that he was in hearty accord with this paper in its efforts to provide better traffic for the citizens of Fredericton.

"This matter that you speak about", said Mr. Olts, "should have been taken up and adjusted long ago. I myself brought the matter up at the city council but nothing has been done in regard to it. So far as routing country traffic away from Queen Street this is the logical thing to do. Whether or not a by-law will have to be provided, I am not certain. I think, however, that the city police have the right to regulate traffic so that accidents will be avoided; and they should be able to do this without any further laws to that effect.

"I regard to the parking of cars along the business side of Queen St., on Saturday nights, as you stated in your paper, I know that the police have instructions to keep these cars on the move, so that they will not be any longer in front of the stores than is absolutely necessary—say half an hour at the latest.

"You might take the matter up with Mayor W. G. Clark", said Mr. Olts, "and find out what he says about any extra by-laws being necessary to divert this traffic".

Ald. Kitchen

Ald. G. Willard Kitchen, chairman of the Roads and Streets committee, in conversation with the Daily Mail said that he entirely agreed with our editorial and the matter of fixing up Campbell street to make it suitable for traffic is now being talked about. There are, he said, a good many bad ruts in this street that will have to be attended to but at the same time this should not be a difficult job to handle.

"The Daily Mail is to be congratulated", said Ald. Kitchen, "in bringing this matter in the public interest, before the public. It is certainly time that something was done about it. But the matter of traffic, of course, lies in the hands of the Police Commission".

His Worship Mayor Clark

His Worship Mayor W. G. Clark said: "I am a member of the Police Commission, am in favor of the suggestion made in last evening's Daily Mail. We have given this thing very much thought and while it will require, in my opinion, an extra by-law to provide for any changes it is worthwhile giving it favorable consideration. We appreciate the interest taken in the matter by the Daily Mail, both last summer and this".

WATER RISING RAPIDLY

The water in the St. John river here is rising at the rate of five and six inches every twenty four hours, according to a report today from the pumping station. The ice is still holding solidly, however, and teams are still crossing the river. The river level took a sharp rise yesterday in the wake of the higher temperature. The ice is not likely to break up for several more weeks but with continuation of the present weather this period may be shortened. Snow is melting at a great rate in this city and in the woods and along the streams.

ASK EXTENSION OF HYDRO LINES TO STANLEY

Delegation From There Pays Informal Visit On the Premier

Long Mooted Matter

Thriving Agricultural Community Would be Benefitted

With the object in view, it is understood, of having hydro electric power extended up through the Nashwaak Valley to include the village of Stanley several residents of that place are paying an informal visit to Premier L. P. D. Tilley here this afternoon. J. D. Palmer, of this city, as one of members of the commission, has been asked to be present. Eldon W. Douglass, H. A. Sanson and Cunn. William T. Griffin comprised the Stanley delegation. The supplying of hydro power to the Stanley area has been mooted for a long time. Today's conference may result in the ultimate accomplishment of such work.

Speaking to The Daily Mail this morning Premier Tilley stated that the gentlemen who were to await upon him in regard to the extension of power were not coming as a delegation but as interested parties in the proposition, who wish to have a little informal talk in regard to the matter.

There is now no hydro supplied to any village or any part of the countryside beyond the town of Marysville and the residents of this fine, thriving
