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## PREMIER TILLEY AT WOODSTOCK

WOODSTOCK, N. B., June 14—A magnificent turn out greeted Premier L. P. D. Tilley and his three candidates for Carleton County here last night. The installation of loud speakers accommodated hundreds of people unable to gain admittance to the theatre. Dr. E. F. Wolverson was chairman.

Hon. F. B. Squires opened the meeting and discussed at some length the party situation and the men forming the opposition party. "These men," he claimed, "are practically the same as those who supported the government of 1917 to 1927." He dealt with the financial situation of the province and said that the attitude of underwriters and the investing public to the credit of the province showed beyond doubt that provincial finances were in good shape.

G. W. Perry compared the road policy of the present government to that which had preceded it, and claimed Carleton County had received much more benefit from the present administration. He said that the Conservative party was interested in the farmers, and, if returned to power, would see that the farmer received assistance.

E. W. Melville, discussed the attitude of the Liberals toward the Conservative county convention. He claimed the reports of drunkenness and disorder had been grossly exaggerated.

Premier Tilley spoke of the loyal support received from the members of Carleton County. He referred to them as the delegation which was present at every government meeting to solicit something in the interests of their county. Of the opposition's promise to relieve unemployment, he did not see how this could be done by any premier of New Brunswick by his policy alone. The speaker submitted that if President Roosevelt with the resources as his command could not do this in the United States, Mr. Dysart stood a very poor chance. The credit of the province is very sound, said the premier. He pledged his party to support every dollar of the province's obligation. He compared the standing of the province with that of Ontario, which, he said, could get no one to buy its bonds. He stated this was the situation of a government elected a year ago on a platform of extravagant promises.

## Potatoes Ten Cents a Barrel at Fort Fairfield

FORT FAIRFIELD, Maine, June 14—Potatoes in this community, a part of the Maine potato empire, yesterday sold as low as 10 cents a barrel, less than the cost of storage, with many producers seeking to unload their surplus at starch factories, which paid 15 cents.

Long lines of trucks, sometimes as many as 32 at a time awaited their turn to unload at starch plants. Fifteen trucks and teams held their place in line overnight at one factory. One local farmer was reported to have made a gift of 2,000 barrels of potatoes to a Fort Fairfield shipper.
