Margaret Sullivan
To Star in "Hollywood
Hotel" Review

Margaret Sullivan, brilliant young dramatic actress of stage and screen, will make her bow before the nationwide radio audience of WABC and the Columbia network tonight, as the guest star on Dick Powell's "Hollywood Hotel" program, on the air from 9:00 to 10:00 P. M., A. S. T. With Randolph Scott as her male support, Miss Sullivan will be heard in a condensed version of her latest picture, "So Red the Rose", adopted from the Stark Young best seller of the same name.

Miss Sullivan needs no introduction to either picture fans or stage audiences, having scored sensationally with both. On Broadway she was featured in "Dinner at Eight" and starred in "A Modern Virgin". In Hollywood she won wide acclaim in "Only Yesterday" and the film version of "Little Man, What Now".

Randolph Scott is the former star of western pictures who recently assumed "white collar" roles with great success. He is cast as Miss Sullivan's leading man in both the picture and the broadcast.

Dick Powell's portion of the full hour dramatic musical revue, of which he is singing star and master-of-ceremonies, probably will again originate from one of Columbia's eastern studios. Dick is making scenes for his newest starring picture at the Annapolis Naval Academy and will rejoin the "Hollywood Hotel" cast in the film capital as soon as the screen musical is completed.

HOLLYWOOD, June 14—The contagious hearty laugh and robust voice of Victor McLaglen heard in countless motion pictures, is now heard in a new series of Red Trails broadcasts from Hollywood over an NBC-WJZ network on Tuesdays at 9:00 P. M., A. S. T. The famous screen star is being starred as a Royal Northwest Mounted Policeman in the new series and is supported by casts of well-known motion picture and radio performers.

McLaglen will be heard in the leading role in broadcasts this month dealing with life in the Royal Northwest Mounted Police force.

Stewart Sterling, author of the previous Red Trails dramas, which were broadcast from New York, has prepared the original scripts for McLaglen, and Jay Hanna, director of the Red Trails series, travelled to Hollywood to supervise the production of the four or more broadcasts starring the noted screen actor.

"The Danger Mark", the first play in the series, presented McLaglen as a hard boiled rookie in the R. N. M. P. as who got his man through sheer persistence and nerve. In the second play, "Killer's Luck", McLaglen tracks a murderer with only a bouquet of flowers as a clue.

These and subsequent roles in the series give the actor parts similar to those which have made his name in motion pictures.
