BARE LEGS AND HEADS

The argument of appearance is the one that counts most strongly in the campaign of the industries against the stockingless girl and the hatless young man, says The Manchester Guardian.

"If it could be shown that a young man in a hat looks more handsome than a young man without one, or that the female leg in a stocking is a more appealing affair than the limb which relies on its own unaided charm, then the industries would have little to fear," the Guardian thinks.

Thomas Levy, M.P. for the Elland riding of Yorkshire, wrote recently: "The habit of discarding stockings, regardless of place or occasion, deserves condemnation, not merely because it has no sanction among people of taste but for the stronger reason that it strikes at the heart of a great industry."

Women hold in their hands the fate of many thousands of workers, Mr. Levy declares and he feels sure that when they realize the facts they will show a sense of loyalty and responsibility to other members of their sex engaged in a trade which can be made or marred by the fashions of the moment.

Kindred industries have in late years flown similar flags of distress. The once flourishing trade in long lace curtains, for instance, is gone, but a closer parallel to the case of women and their stockings is found amongst the young men who have discarded the wearing of hats, a fashion which the hatters say spells ruin to an ancient and important trade.

"Whether such protests have much effect seems a matter of considerable doubt," remarks The Guardian. "Fashions, except in the case of those who serve them professionally, are seldom concerned with economics; they are a matter of the look of the thing and the mood of the hour. Will young men wear hats or will young women wear stockings merely in order to support the deserving trades which produce those articles? It seems a little doubtful."

ITALY AND THE LEAGUE

Of the reported readiness of Italy to follow Japan and Germany out of the League if the Council intervenes in its row with Ethiopia, we have long been warned, both by intimations from Mussolini and by the nature of the elements affected. The Associated Press cites the Italian government as merely contending that the controversy is not within the League's competence. But the issue runs deeper than any single difference as to jurisdiction.

On the one hand there is the conception of a national self-sufficiency which is the key of that Italian destiny to which Il Duce aspires. On the other there is a conception of the organization of states whose differences are susceptible to arbitration by a council with authority transcending that of any one of them in international action—which is the League.

How the two conceptions can be reconciled with neither losing force is impossible to imagine. As often as it had been attempted, it has failed. The national psychology which Mussolini fosters rests on the notion of a wholly self-reliant entity, wholly free, wholly master of itself and attaining at last to superiority to its surroundings. It is the psychology of the modern dictator wherever he is in command. To compromise it with an admission that it is amenable to another and higher authority would be fatal to the whole conception.

The success of the League depends on a common point of view which is at diametrical odds with the spirit of any modern state in which inner cohesion is maintained by a persistent cultivation of national feeling. Its string of failures in issues in which the point has been this conflict of views will continue while this nationalism burns brightly in a dozen lands.

MAURETANIA JUNK

What becomes of an ocean queen when she is turned over to the breakers? While the new Normandie was priming for a record crossing, sentimentalists gathered at Southampton for another of the last rites over the Mauretania, late dowager of the Atlantic. Her fittings were sold at auction, and brought a total of 15,000 pounds.

Her insignia, red and blue, brought five pounds apiece. Her stern lettering, giving her name and hailing port, went for 50 guineas. Another 160 guineas was paid for her port side lettering, and the letters of her starboard side brought 11 pounds a letter. Sixty five guineas was top bid for her ship's bell. Her identifications removed, she proceeds to Rosyth to be junked. From there, the salvage of broken ships returns to commerce—some of it in odd and interesting ways.

British weeklies lately have carried a Rosyth breaker's ad for garden furniture, built of battleship teak "to last forever." A guarantee goes with each chair and settee that it came from a man-of-war late of His Majesty's Service; provoking those of a speculative turn to ponder what might be saved the taxpayers of the civilized world if all that went directly into garden seats, without putting in an expensive interlude as a dance floor for young gentlemen in blue and gold.

Nascopie Starts Voyage To Arctic

Halifax, June 27—The Hudson's Bay Company steamship Nascopie was sailing up the Nova Scotia coast today on the way to Montreal on the first leg of her annual voyage to the Arctic.

Steaming out of Halifax yesterday with Captain Thomas F. Smellie in command, the Nascopie will take on missionaries, Royal Canadian Mounted Police officers, company employees and Government officials before continuing on her long summer voyage to the frozen northland. Tons of supplies will be placed aboard, to be distributed at various outposts on the vessel's route.

The Nascopie will not be seen in Halifax again until some time in September.

TORONTO, June 27—T. B. Horkins, appearing as counsel for John E. Cave 62, charged with reckless driving, surprised a magistrate today when he pleaded that his client be prevented from driving for life.

"My client is highly nervous and should not drive a car," Horkins said. "I suggest his driving license be cancelled for life. He might kill someone." The court adjourned the case to think it over.




