

SEVERITY OF WINTER STRIKES IN THE CAPITAL

Northwest Winds and 8
Below Zero Snap Visit
Central N. B.

Eight Inches of Snow
Highways Are Drifted
In Rural Sections
Today

A typical northern winter greeted the eyes—and ears—of citizens as they rose this morning to go to their work. Besides an eight-degree below zero temperature, blustery northwest winds blew today making the setting one of the most severe of the current winter season. Even if March this year doesn't go "out like a lion", it seems that January is destined to.

A fall of eight inches of snow yesterday blanketed the New Brunswick landscape, adding to the increased fall of snow in recent weeks, and serving to block a number of the rural routes by soft, drifting snow. This morning farmers had some difficulty in getting out of their backyards so thick was the snow.

The present week so far has been one of the most typically winter so far this season. On Monday morning the mercury in Central New Brunswick was as low as 23 below zero here and in other parts even lower. At Edmundston it was nearer 33 degrees. Yesterday was blustery with a thick fall of snow and drifting, and today was windy and severe.

Present conditions will be an aid to lumbermen in the province who have been wishing for more snow for a foundation for hauling. Today's conditions ought to please the magnates for besides the snow there is colder weather which will facilitate sledding.

EXPECT NO STATE BALL FOR HOUSE OPENING

Usual Gala Social Event
Likely To Be Dispensed
With This Season

Arrangements
Major Barker Has No
Definite Instructions
Yet of Ceremonies

The state ball, which for the past several winters has lent dignity and auspiciousness to the opening of the New Brunswick Legislature is likely to be dispensed with this year. So far Major T. C. Barker, official secretary to the governor, has had no word as to whether or not there will be a ball this year. At his offices here today Major Barker stated that so far he had had no orders of any kind, either on the matter of arrangements for the swearing-in of the prospective new Lieutenant-governor, Hon. Dr. Murray MacLaren, or for the House opening, on February 14.

It had been previously expected that Hon. Dr. MacLaren and family would arrive here today from Ottawa, as also Premier Tilley and members of his cabinet, who will be sworn in under the new Lieutenant-governor.

However, it was indicated today that the ceremony of swearing-in the new lieutenant-governor will take place tomorrow as originally planned. Hon. Dr. MacLaren is expected here this evening or tomorrow as are also members of the provincial cabinet and Premier Tilley.

E. J. Lemaire, clerk of the Privy Council of Canada, is expected here either tonight or tomorrow with the new lieutenant-governor's commission.

Major Barker intimated today that the military manoeuvres on the occasion of the opening of the Legislature on the 14th inst., will be similar to other years. There will not likely be any changes in the usual procedure on that day. The official secretary is expected to announce complete details either tonight or tomorrow.

POTATO MEN HEAR OF ORDERLY MARKETING

Word From P.E.I. Today
of Great Interest to
the Farmers

Trade Stimulant

The potato farmers in this area learned with interest today of the announcement from Charlottetown, P. E. I. that the new potato marketing regulations with provision for the pegging of prices, the orderly marketing of the product and the prevention of ruinous price-cutting would go into effect in the Maritime Provinces and Ontario on Friday. The announcement was made by J. J. Trainor, marketing agent for Prince Edward Island under the Potato Marketing Board.

Of the four agents in each of the four provinces, G. C. Cunningham is the agent in this city. Today Mr. Cunningham could not be reached for a statement as he was out of town on business.

J. K. King, deputy minister of agriculture, said here today that while he expected that no announcement would be made until a later date, nevertheless he believes the details as made by Mr. Trainor were in line with those recommended.
