RADIO SPOTS

Edwin C. Hill is being sought by a sponsor to do a one-time appearance on a stupendous or colossal program to announce a new product. . . An OK from his present sponsors would be necessary first. Nelson Eddy Sings From Radio City

NEW YORK, N. Y., Feb. 25—Nelson Eddy, noted young American baritone who has just returned from a motion picture engagement in Hollywood, will be featured with William Daly's Symphonic String Orchestra and a male chorus at the Voice of Firestone broadcast over an NBC-WEAF network tonight at 9:30 P. M., A. S. T.

This will be the first time that Eddy who alternates on the Voice of Firestone programs with Richard Crooks and Gladys Swarthout, has sung from Radio City. His previous Voice of Firestone recitals have been picked up from the NGC Hollywood studio.

For his first Eastern concert Eddy will sing the Evening Star from "Tannhauser", and "Sylvia" as solos. He also will offer the Garden Duet from "Boris Godounow", with Margaret Speaks soprano, and will sing "Play Gypsies, Dance Gypsies" from "Countess Maritza"; "Song of the Mounties" from "Rose Marie", and "Brown October Ale" from "Robin Hood" with the male chorus.

How many people can bring about a change in a radio program? Five thousand letters, if "Club Romance," heard Sundays at 9 p.m. AST, on CBS is typical. For that many people wrote in praising the singing of Conrad Thibault and Lois Benne't and the music of the Hinds' Orchestra under Don Voorhees, and asking for more, so the plot of the story and the dialogues was replaced by more music.

MICROPHONICS

With Beatrice Lillie, the international comedienne, and Bob Hope, the English-born but American-reared comedian, the nobility is well represented on the NBC air lanes. Miss Lillie in private life is Lady Peel, widow of Sir Robert Peel, and Hope in England is Lord Hope, the seventeenth Baronet of Craighall. His father was a famed British star of operetta and is a direct lineal descendant of "Mad Anthony" Hope.

NBC studio pick-ups: Robert Simmons, the tenor who owns a country home at Cornwall-on-the-Hudson, has a local reputation as one of the best tree-choppers in the country. . . Walter Winchell is married to the former June Magee, a vaudeville dancer once the Astor of the feminine team of Astor and Hill. . . Grace Donaldson of the Don Hall Trio is the sister of Florence Shirley, with whom she once appeared in vaudeville. . . Louis (Sherlock Holmes) Hector is the husband of Lucille Wall, radio and stage player.

Kate Smith Presents Winners on the New-Star Revue Series

When Kate Smith went to Buffalo several weeks ago to judge the auditions for her New-Star Revue broadcast, she selected Alene McKenna, lyric soprano, and the High Hatters Male Trio, both popular local favorites. They will make their network debut on the Hudson broadcast over the WABC-Columbia network tonight from 9:30 to 10:00 P. M., A. S. T.

Miss McKenna won through her rendition of "Birds' Songs at Eventide", the number which she will sing on the chain broadcast this Monday. She is an attractive blonde, 17 years old, and a junior in high school where she is majoring in Pine Arts. At present she is studying for night opera. This will be her first radio work.

The High Hatters Male Trio is composed of Robert Schmidt, John Eisenberger and Elmer Hattenberger, ages ranging from 18 to 22. All are graduates of the Maston Park High School. They have been broadcasting locally over Station WKBW and WGR for 18 months. Their visit to Manhattan for the Kate Smith program will be their first trip outside of Buffalo.

Altogether, more than 11,000 radio aspirants have been given auditions in eight cities for the chance to appear on this program.
