(Continued from Page Eight) high as 108, and several up to a point 115. Most of the thermometers, however, were in the sun. The official temperature was a few degrees over the one hundred mark.

A report from Edmundston this morning to The Daily Mail was that the mercury there had reached 107 degrees, the highest mark in the province if this is official. The report further stated that a big forest fire blaze was raging in the vicinity of the River Iroquois.

One of the novel occurrences in the province in the wake of the terrific heat was that which happened in Charles Nichols' barnyard at the Red and Green cabins on the Woodstock Road. Thirty roosters died of the heat.
