necessary. From relatives and Wilford MacDonald, 17, who was in the car with brother and sister when the accident occurred, the coroner learned the details of the accident.

MacDonald told the coroner that he and Elbridge Moir had motored to Parker's Ridge to bring Annie Moir, aged 19, to her home. The girl drove on the way back. The accident had occurred when the car was proceeding down a hill en route home. Elbridge, according to young MacDonald, thought the car was out of control, and pulled on the emergency brake. The auto turned sideways and overturned. The MacDonald boy remembered nothing after that and Annie Moir was in such a high nervous state today that she could tell the coroner very little. Both MacDonald and the Moir girl were unhurt, although both suffered from shock.

The body of young Moir was taken by motor hearse to Boiestown today, and funeral arrangements will be made later today.

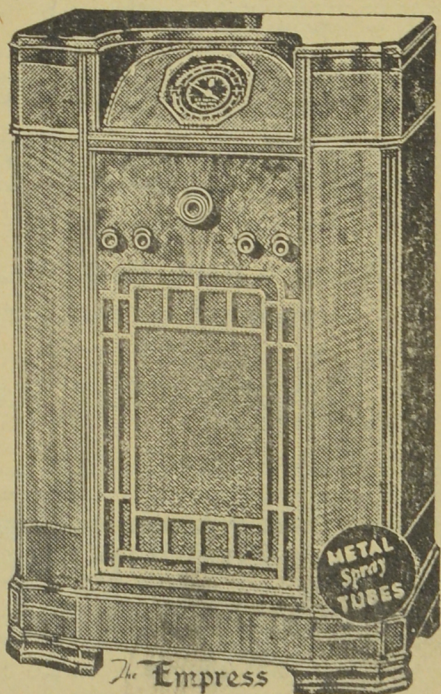
