CANADA HAS FIRST MIDSHIPMAN PILOT

VANCOUVER, Oct. 18-The distinct tion of being the first Merchant Service midshipman in the British Empire to receive a pilot's "A" license for aviation goes to Cadet Captain Walter R. N. Sturdy of this city, now making his first voyage on the Empress of Japan.

HALIFAX, Oct. 18-Perjury by with nesses testifying before the Grand Jury of the Supreme Court here is de-plored in a report submitted by the jury to Mr. Justice R. H. Graham.

Declaring perjury was "obvious" in some instances, the jurymen assert they view this circumstance with "serious concern." 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
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
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
