

BOIESTOWN BOY IN AUTO MISHAP, DIES

Elbridge Moir Driving
With Sister, Blowout
Caused Accident

Died in Hospital Here

Coroner Dr. MacKay
and R. C. M. P. are
Investigating

Elbridge Moir, 16-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. George A. Moir of Boiestown, died in the Victoria Public Hospital at 1:55 o'clock this morning as the result of injuries received when the car in which the youth was riding with his sister between Boiestown and Parker's Ridge yesterday afternoon, left the road and overturned.

The youth was brought to the hospital here early last evening and an operation performed to save his life. Direct cause of death was reported to be shock and hemorrhage. The boy suffered a fractured skull and a fracture of the left leg, also various protrusions about the head.

Are Investigating

Dr. Charles MacKay, coroner, of this city, and Lance Corporal Ryder of the R. C. M. P. left this morning for the scene of the accident to investigate the circumstances. Before leaving Dr. MacKay viewed the body. Decision regarding an inquest is being withheld until the full circumstances are enquired into.

The accident is believed to have been caused directly from a blowout of one of the tires. Young Moir had driven his car from his home to Parker's Ridge where his sister was teaching school. He intended to bring his sister home after school. The sister drove the Moir car on the way home. The father, George A. Moir, who was in the city last evening, was uncertain how the accident happened and according to report the Moir girl remembers nothing of what happened after the blowout occurred.

How It Happened

Dr. Charles MacKay returned today at noon from Boiestown. After investigating the circumstances of the accident he decided that no inquest was

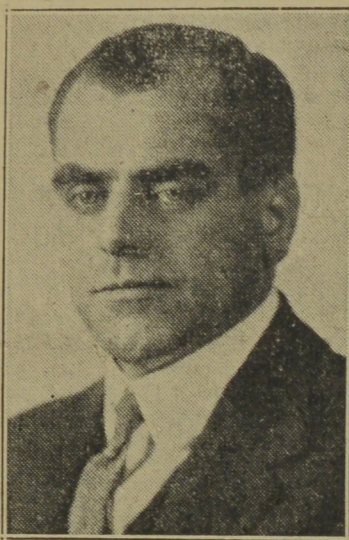
Will Organize Recreation

James S. Summers, dean of physical education of the South America Y. M. C. A. Training school at Montevideo, arrived here this morning from Saint John, and tonight at the Christchurch Parish church he will commence a Recreation School for this vicinity, organization to be completed on Sunday.

Mr. Summers lectured to the students of the Provincial Normal School this morning on "Recreation in South America", his talk being very interesting. This evening he will meet the

Y. M. C. A. Board in this city. In addition Mr. Summers will hold a session tomorrow afternoon at the Parish hall, commencing at 2:30 o'clock.

Won Olympic Fame

Clark Ready, physical director of the Y. M. C. A. in Saint John accompanied Mr. Summers to the capital this morning and will give active demonstrations of physical education, while the South American visitor will lead the talks.

Mr. Summers is a native of Australia. He is a graduate from the Y. M. C. A. College at Springfield, Mass., and participated in the London Olympic Games as a gymnast. Also he was in charge of a team in the Olympics, and at one time was leader of physical education in Great Britain, after which he went to South America to head Y. M. C. A. work there.

Ralph Albrant, the efficient successor to Murray Ross as leader of Y. M. C. A. work in this city, took a group of Y. M. C. A. workers to Saint John last evening to hear Mr. Summers speak last night in that city.

W. I. MEETING ENDS

LUMBERMEN CONFER TODAY WITH CABINET

Representatives of Op-
erators and Lease
Holders Here

Finish Today

Hon. F. W. Pirie Warns
That Partridge Bag
Limit Not Changed

A delegation of crown land lease holders and lumber operators of the province are in session with members of the New Brunswick Government here today with a view to "working out a program on a plan sufficiently broad to cope with the unemployment situation on the North Shore", Premier A. A. Dysart stated today.

Among those who are in the city today who are thought to be representing lumber interests are K. S. MacLachlan, president of Fraser companies, Ltd., H. H. Henderson E. Ross and R. G. McFarlane, all of the same company, and representatives from Bamford Bros. Ludlow, and Russell and Swin, Doaktown.

Promote Industry

It is thought that today's meeting is linked with a conference which the government had here yesterday with delegations representing the counties of Northumberland and Gloucester, who it is understood, urged that all possible steps be taken to promote industrial development in those counties in order to provide employment.

It is also understood that an estimate of the operators' winter cuts will be disclosed to the government and then a closer estimate of the amount of relief for next winter could be made. Representatives of the counties will confer this month on questions of relief aid for the winter, and it is understood that the government will

Mrs. George Black is
Member-Elect for
Yukon Territory

Husband Ex-Speaker

Mrs. Black has Back-
ground of Variety of
Accomplishments

Mrs. George Black, wife of the former speaker of the House of Commons at Ottawa, who is member-elect for the Yukon Territory in the House of Commons, is well known in Fredericton, and her election is learned here with pleasure by her many friends. She and Mr. Black, who was then speaker in the House of Commons, visited Fredericton about two years ago and while here were the guests of Mrs. H. F. MacLeod.

About a year ago Mr. Black resigned his seat in the House owing to ill-health and since that time has been practicing law in Vancouver. His wife, always ready to assist in public affairs, took the nomination to represent the Conservative party in the Yukon, and ran in the recent election as an independent Conservative.

Born In U. S.

Although born in the United States, Mrs. Black became naturalized shortly after her marriage and since that time has worked hard in the interests of her adopted country. Both Mr. and Mrs. Black have been in the Yukon for more than thirty-five years and during that time have won the love and admiration of the people there.

During the World War Mrs. Black went to England with the Yukon contingent and was active there as a relief worker amongst the wounded soldiers. She also was prominent as a

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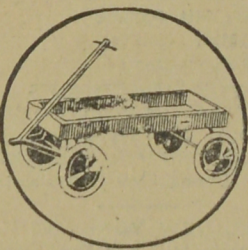
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
